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## Rev Liz writes


*Dear all,*


### Hurricane devastation in the USA

'Because,' the gentleman said, 'I didn't need one then.'


## Letter from the Editor

## MATINS AT OCKLEY

*“After weeks and months of rain the waters abated, and the Weald country south of Leith Hill and along the county boundary became more accessible to the pedestrian.*

*Strikes had disorganised the railway service and a breakdown near Cheam made railway travelling a tedious adventure.*

*It was late afternoon before Ockley Station was reached, a mile and a half to the village, no means of conveyance, both Inns full and overflowing with Easter visitors, and most cottages in a similar condition; night was falling before I found quarters in the house of the village shoe maker, a comfortable haven for which I was devoutly thankful”.*

*Thus wrote the late James S Ogilvy in his book “A Pilgrimage in Surrey” published in 1914.*

My first visit to St Margaret’s church in Ockley was on Sunday 6th August 2017 because there was no service at Capel due to the Rev Liz Richardson being on holiday.

It is an extended walk from Rickwood Park to Ockley and I was most grateful to Mr Silliman for conveyance in his motor vehicle. Along the way, we collected Dr Ashwood from Capel village and in a short time we arrived at St Margaret’s for the 9.30am Matins service.


As part of the congregation of Capel, we received a warm welcome to the church. The church is about half a mile east from the village, and is a picturesque building with a square stone tower. Inside, are monuments to the Steeres of Jayes Park, the Arbuthnots of Elderslie and the Calverts of Ockley Court.

The service was conducted by two of the charming ladies and it was wonderful to experience the music from a traditional pipe organ.

It was good to see a number of people from Capel in the congregation and after the service coffee and refreshments were available. This allowed for much conversation and I left with Mr Silliman and Dr Ashwood by car, with a feeling of warmth and friendliness.

# The Capel Classic Car Show 2017

The Capel Show 2017 turned out to be a fantastic event, with by all accounts the highest numbers ever recorded. Throughout the day people kept commenting how busy the grounds were, and how full the public car park field. In rough numbers we counted 670 classic exhibits in the grounds. An estimated 3000 people came through the main entrance and another 1500 in exhibits, auto jumble and horticultural stalls etc. there were over 1200 cars in the public car park. Takings at the gate were up to nearly £12,445 (22% up from last year). We don't have the full picture yet of money made. We are in the process of collating all the information from the various sources and will have a clearer picture towards the end of September.

In the mean time of course we have to congratulate all the people that have put so much effort in to make such an event happen. Between the Classic Car & Bike Show and the Horticultural Society there must have been around a 100 volunteers on the day.

**Editor's Note:** This month there were 25 Saint's days to choose from! So I have edited it down to just three that I hope are of interest to you all!

### **1st September - Drithelm - Vision of the after-life**

Drithelm is the saint for you if you have ever wondered what lies beyond death, or have had a near-death experience. He was married and living in Cunningham (now Ayrshire, then Northumbria) in the 7th century when he fell ill and apparently died. When he revived a few hours later he caused panic among the mourners, and was himself deeply shaken by the whole experience.

Drithelm went to pray in the village church until daylight, and during those long hours reviewed the priorities of his life in the light of what he had seen while 'dead'. A celestial guide had shown him souls in hell, in purgatory, in paradise and heaven... suddenly the reality of God and of coming judgement and of what Christ had done in redeeming mankind became real to him, and his life on earth could never be the same again.

Next day he divided his wealth into three: giving one third to his wife, one third to his sons, and the remainder to the poor. He became a monk and went to live at Melrose, where he spent his time in prayer and contemplation of Jesus.

Drithelm's Vision of the after-life is remarkable in that it was the first example of this kind of literature from England. It was SO early: seventh century Anglo-Saxon England! Drithelm has even been seen as a remote precursor of Dante.

On a lighter note, Drithelm can also be a saint for you if you didn't get abroad this summer, but ventured to swim instead off one of our beaches: he used to stand in the cold waters of the Tweed for hours, reciting Psalms.

### **5th September - Laurence Giustiniani - The Saint who knew how to help a beggar**

You are walking down the road when a beggar approaches you for money. What do you do? If, instead of giving money, you buy him/her coffee or a meal, then you are in good company: you are following in the steps of the first ever Bishop of Venice.

Laurence Giustiniani (1381 – 1455) was born of a noble Venetian family, but chose the austerity of the Augustinian monastery of San Giorgio on island of Alga. He became a priest in 1406, prior in 1407, Bishop of Castello in 1433 and then in 1451 the first ever Bishop of Venice.

By then, Laurence had seen a lot of human nature, and was wise as well as good. Frugal in his private life, and happy to help the poor, he made sure that he gave wisely as well as generously. Hence the poor who came to him for help were given food and clothing - but only very occasionally small amounts of money. Bishop Laurence also devoted himself to peace-making and other pastoral work, for which his contemporaries held him in high esteem. As he lay dying on a bed of straw, very many clergy, laity, beggars and destitute folk came to grieve: he was greatly respected and loved. Wise giving and peace-making – Laurence's example still shines true today.

### **14th September - Holy Cross Day**

On Holy Cross Day the Church celebrates the Cross as a symbol of triumph, as the sign of Christ's victory over death. Holy Cross Day goes right back to 14 September 335, and we have the mother of a Roman Emperor to thank for it.

Helena was a devout Christian, and after her son, Constantine, was converted, they agreed that she should travel from Rome to Israel, and seek out the places of special significance to Christians.

Of course, much of Jerusalem had been destroyed by the Romans around 135 AD. But even so, Helena finally located what she believed to be the sites of the Crucifixion and of the Burial (and modern archaeologists think she may well be correct). The sites were so close together that she built one large church over them - the Church of the Holy Sepulchre.

That church, built in honour of the Cross, was dedicated on 14 September 335.


The sign of the Cross has been used by Christians since early times. Tertullian, writing his *De Corona* (3:2) around AD 211, noted that Christians seldom did anything significant without making the sign of the cross.

What is its significance? Well, people often put their initials or some sort of personal mark on something to show that it belongs to them. The Cross is the personal mark of our Lord Jesus Christ, and we mark it on ourselves as a sign that we belong to him. Even in the book of Revelation, we read that the servants of God are 'sealed' or 'marked' on their foreheads as a sign that they are His.

A preacher once put it this way: if you were explaining to someone how to make a cross, you would say: "Draw an I." That is you standing before the Lord, saying, 'here I am'. Then cancel that vertical stroke with a horizontal stroke – as if to say: "Lord, I abandon my self-will and make you the centre of my life instead. I abandon myself to your love and service."

On Holy Cross Day, we recall Jesus' wonderful promise: "And when I am lifted up, I will draw all men unto me." (John 12:32)

### Information about a New Scheme for Regular Givers!

We would like to introduce you to a *new scheme for regular givers*, backed by the Diocese which is much easier to administer than standing orders. **The Parish Giving Scheme** allows regular donations easily using a centrally operated direct debit system. The system also claims all gift aid, where authorised by the giver and passes it on to the parish the same month. This is much quicker and more convenient than the

current standing order.

We have trialled the system with some willing volunteers who have found it easy to sign up. We now hope that you will follow suit.

It can be read in the Bible in Genesis chs. 37:1-36, 39:1-20


Jacob had 12 sons but his favourite was Joseph, his beloved Rachel's son. He even gave him special clothes to wear...





## God in the Arts

*Editor: Outstanding people in great stories of the Bible - as depicted in painting or sculpture – that is the theme of God in the Arts this year. This month the Revd Michael Burgess considers the portrait of the calling of Matthew, by Caravaggio.*

### **‘He gave us eyes to see them’: Caravaggio’s Matthew in the Contarelli**

This month we turn to the treasury of stories in the New Testament. 21<sup>st</sup> September is the feast day of St Matthew the evangelist, and his call by Jesus is described without any embellishment in chapter 9 of his Gospel. It was a bold step for Jesus to call a tax collector, someone so hated by the people. And it was an equally bold step for Matthew to respond – to turn from the security and profit of his lifestyle and step out into the unknown.



It is the subject of one of three paintings on Matthew’s life that Caravaggio produced for the Contarelli Chapel of the church of San Luigi in Rome in 1560. The group of tax collectors are about their daily routine of counting money. They are dressed in rich 16<sup>th</sup> century Italian costumes. Jesus and Peter break into that scene on the right wearing ordinary cloaks. They are even barefoot by contrast. But it is Jesus in the shadow who brings light onto the canvas, and that play on light and darkness heightens the dramatic intensity of the scene. We see simply the face of Jesus and his right hand pointing. But pointing to whom? Is it the bearded man who seems to say, ‘Is it me?’ or is He pointing to the younger man at the end of the table engrossed in his money?

Perhaps Caravaggio is saying that Jesus can call any and all of us. His call to follow can break into our daily routine at any time of day, whoever we are, whatever we have to commend ourselves, and whatever our faults and worries. As He says in that same chapter, ‘I have come to call not the righteous, but sinners.’ We can take heart that His church is not a museum of saints: it is a kingdom of sinners who have the courage, like Matthew, to follow.

## Handel's Messiah - Coming to Dorking December 2017

Merry Opera revives its staged production of Handel's Messiah for a ninth tour.

Merry Opera – a professional touring opera company - is reviving its staged production of Handel's Messiah to churches in London, East Anglia and the south in November and December 2017.

This production, which has been touring to churches since 2011 and has been seen by over 7,000 people, is being revived for its ninth tour this November and December. It is created and directed by John Ramster, whose recent contracts include work at the Guildhall and Royal Northern College in the UK and in Finland, Serbia, Portugal, France and Norway.

Although the Messiah is a religious piece, you don't have to be religious to see this production. It is staged as a meditation on the nature of the human spirit and its need for faith – perhaps in God or perhaps in oneself.

Rather than stage the oratorio with a large choir and orchestra, we allow just 12 singers and the church organ to portray characters you'll find instantly recognizable. They explain through the original words of the oratorio what has brought them to a spiritual place, both figuratively and literally, where they need help and comfort.

Turning to a building that bears witness to the collective memory, rituals and traditions of the generations who came before us, these characters are not alone, for the way in which they get to know each other through the music and the words of the oratorio gives each one of them a sense of belonging and the strength to go forward.

As you take your seat for the performance, you'll find that the church looks pretty much as it does every day. There's no special lighting, no lines of chairs for a choir, no music stands for an orchestra. The person sitting next to you may turn out to be one of the professional opera singers.

The conductor is Mark Austin, who is artistic director of the Faust Chamber Orchestra, and whose contracts include work with the BBC & Bournemouth Symphony Orchestras and the Hangzhou Philharmonic in China. The organist for is Richard Leach, whose work includes performances in the Wigmore Hall, Charlton House, and live on Radio 3 and with the English Baroque Choir. He is also the organist at Ealing Abbey.

Merry Opera has been touring the UK and occasionally abroad since 2009. Its shows have been seen by about 50,000 people in theatres, churches, the open air, among ruins, in public streets and in a Wetherspoon pub.






## BGF supports vital work with the disadvantaged and vulnerable in Godalming



The Bishop of Guildford's Foundation (BGF) is providing £3,600 towards the core costs of running [The Cellar Café](#) in Godalming. The café is an arm of the Warehouse Christian Trust and its principal objective is to provide a secure, affordable and friendly place for disadvantaged and vulnerable people in the community to meet and discuss problems amongst themselves and with café staff and volunteers. Currently the project is run by two part-time members of staff and a team of volunteers.



Over the years, The Cellar Café has opened its arms to many different disadvantaged or misunderstood groups of people in the community, such as those with mental health problems, people with learning difficulties, those with drug or alcohol addiction, and those who have suffered breakdowns or serious illnesses. The team has close relationships with Social Services, Rethink, the Meath Epilepsy Trust, the CAB, local medical practices and churches; people are often referred to The Cellar by these organisations.

Customers who come to the café are offered a listening ear and practical support with their problems. A free meal is available to any who come in need, and at Christmas-time the team distributes food parcels to individuals and local families who are known to be in need. An art group, run in partnership with the Watts Gallery, provides the opportunity for people to find fulfilment and friendship, together with a sense of purpose. A quiet room is also available, providing a refuge and a place for private discussion and for affordable counselling.

Jacky Beale, a trustee of The Warehouse Christian Trust said: "It's not always obvious in a town like Godalming, but two wards have the highest level of overall deprivation in the Borough of Waverley and the highest risk and incidence of mental health issues in Surrey. The rate of suicide is 25% above the national average and we have the highest rate of depression in Surrey. We are very grateful for this grant from the Bishop of Guildford's Foundation, and the continued support will help us to cope with the increasing needs of our customers, by providing a unique facility in the community."

Grant-making by the BGF is managed through the Community Foundation for Surrey (CFS), an independent trust which is part of the national network of community foundations. By making grants through CFS, the Foundation is able to keep its costs to a minimum. CFS can also, on occasions, find other sources of funding to support grant applicants.

# MOVIE MOMENTS

## Communal heroism

Christopher Nolan, the writer and director of *Dunkirk* describes the true event on which it is based as 'one of the greatest stories in human history'. Brilliantly bucking the trend of recent war films he does not resort to gore and special effects, as he provides an immersive experience that enables the viewer to empathise with the young soldiers in their apparently hopeless situation, trapped between the sea and the advancing German army.

By cleverly moving around the timeline, we experience the different perspectives on land, sea and air. Particularly powerful is the interplay between two characters on one of the small boats heading to Dunkirk. Cillian Murphy plays a shell-shocked soldier picked up from a torpedoed ship, on the outward journey, and desperate not to be taken back towards the beach. Previously having starring roles in Nolan films (*Inception*, *The Dark Knight*) here Murphy is credited only as 'Shivering Soldier', a nameless character representing the 338,000 beaten and demoralised men who were rescued. Also in the boat is the 17-year-old George (played by Barry Keoghan) who is the only character whose back-story is revealed, when he says he has never achieved anything but wants to do something valuable with his life. George's only skills appear to be making tea and carrying life-jackets, thus providing a poignant representation of the many ordinary people who joined together to make the Dunkirk evacuation possible.




Nolan says: 'as a group of people we can achieve so much more than we can individually', an important message for all of us. At that crucial time in history, King George VI called the nation to pray. As we pray for our nation today, perhaps God will open our eyes to see how we can each use our limited skills and resources for the common good.
