

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#### Rev Liz writes continued

With that in mind, we are seeking to embrace the future and to let God lead us into his plans for Capel and surrounding parishes. As you know a few years ago St John the Baptist became one third of the Surrey Weald Team of Churches, which has been a great blessing in many ways. The Diocese has now asked our church to explore some more pastoral re-organisation and to look at uniting with St Margaret's Church in Ockley. They are part of a united benefice made up of the parishes of Ockley, Okewood and Forest Green otherwise known as OOFG. Okewood and Forest Green will now merge with Ewhurst and become a new benefice and the plan is that Margaret's Ockley will join with Capel in becoming a united parish but still part of the Surrey Weald Team.



...if you have been affected by any of the issues raised in this sermon...

Well by now you are probably very confused and I will let you know more next month as the consultation process develops and community notices will be put up. But basically I will be serving across both Capel and Ockley on a full time basis instead of half time as I currently do (in theory)! There will be some adjustment for both churches on service times but otherwise occasional offices such as baptisms, weddings and funerals will be taken by me with occasional help from other clergy within the team as needed. Both churches will continue to hold their own festival services and other important markers in the church year, so in many respects and regarding the question of finance we will still be two churches, but united in our management and pastoral oversight. Personally I think this is an exciting opportunity for both our parishes, to be able to build on our individual strengths and to support one another on our weaker areas. We have already begun to get to know one another enjoying a service at St Margaret's in the summer and you will notice in the calendar they are joining us for a service this month. As you will see October is a busy month again and by the time you read this we may well have celebrated Harvest. Later this month we remember all those who have died in our service of remembrance for the bereaved as we commemorate All Souls Day'. Please do mark in your diaries the

#### Christian Aid responds to those suffering in South Asia floods

Christian Aid is bringing emergency relief to families in India, Nepal and Bangladesh as more than a thousand people have been killed and 40 million more affected by floods.

The charity has deployed £45,000 of emergency funds and is also using a further £200,000 from Irish Aid and the DFID-backed START fund to provide 4000 households with hygiene kits, tarpaulin, shelter materials and community water filters to provide safe drinking water. Elsewhere 20,000 families are being taught about good hygiene practices to protect themselves from diseases.



Christian Aid's Head of Humanitarian Programmes for Asia & Middle East, Madara Hettiarachchi, said she hoped people wouldn't forget people in South Asia whilst floods in Texas were dominating the news agenda. 'These are some of the worst floods we've seen in South Asia in decades and the impact is likely only going to get worse,' she said. 'Farms and livestock have been washed away so food security is going to be a huge problem in the

coming days and we will likely see the death toll rise.

'The good news is we are reaching people and bringing them the vital help they need to stay alive and begin to rebuild their lives.

#### **High Days & Holy Days in October**

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#### St Luke's Day 18th October

Lester Amann considers the debt we owe to St Luke.

#### Luke: beloved physician and historian

We know a good doctor when we meet one! He or she will ask lots of questions and carefully observe how we are feeling. They will look and listen; administer tests and accurately recorded their findings.

Unlike the Gospel writers Matthew, Mark and John, Luke was not a disciple of Jesus. He was trained as a doctor, probably a Gentile and certainly an educated Greek. As Luke didn't know Jesus personally, he needed his interview skills as a physician to speak with people who knew Jesus. He listened to their stories and identified the truth from hearsay.

Luke's Gospel has a very human touch to it and begins with two detailed descriptions of the births of two important babies! He often writes about our Lord's encounters with individuals; men, women, children, the poor and the rich, the sick and the strong. He showed Christ's sympathy for people who were underprivileged, hurting and weak. Luke was a keen observer and wrote both as a careful historian and with the heart of a loving physician.

If we didn't have Luke's Gospel we would lack so much. For example, we wouldn't know about: the angels' and shepherds' visit at the birth of Jesus; the visit by the boy Jesus to the temple; the parables of the Good Samaritan and the Prodigal Son; the encounters of Jesus with Zacchaeus, and the two men on their walk to Emmaus.

Luke's tenderness is revealed with his emphasis on prayer, the Holy Spirit, the role of women in the ministry of Jesus and God's forgiveness of sins. He describes Jesus' compassion for the widow of Nain and our Lord's mercy to the dying thief on the cross.

Luke also wrote the Book of Acts. This is another trusted record about the beginnings of the early Church. Luke was a companion of Paul and was with him on many journeys. Without the Book of Acts, we would know very little about Paul's life and other followers of Christ including Barnabas, Silas and Timothy. Luke was a man not writing about distant historical figures or dramas, but about people he knew first-hand.

Luke wrote his Gospel so that there would be an accurate and an orderly account of the life, ministry and message of Jesus. He carefully researched his material and spoke to eye-witnesses. He listened to those who had been with Jesus and worked alongside leaders and workers of the fledgling church.

A physician identifies our need and helps us to get well. Luke saw our need to have Jesus as our heavenly Physician. Our eternal life and salvation can only be found through faith in Him.

#### 31 All Hallows Eve - or Holy Evening

Modern Halloween celebrations have their roots with the Celtic peoples of pre-Christian times.

In those long-ago days, on the last night of October, the Celts celebrated the Festival of Samhain, or 'Summer's End'. The priests, or Druids, performed ceremonies to thank and honour the sun. For there was a very dark side to all this: Samhain also signalled the onset of winter, a time when it was feared that unfriendly ghosts, nature-spirits, and witches roamed the earth, creating mischief. So the Druid priests lit great bonfires and performed magic rites to ward off or appease these dark supernatural powers.

Then the Romans arrived, and brought their Harvest Festival which honoured the Goddess Pomona with gifts of apples and nuts. The two festivals slowly merged.

#### **High Days & Holy Days in October**

#### 31 All Hallows Eve - or Holy Evening continued

When Christianity arrived still later, it began to replace the Roman and Druid religions. 1st November - All Saints' Day - was dedicated to all Christian Martyrs and Saints who had died. It was called 'All Hallows' Day'. The evening before became an evening of prayer and preparation and was called 'All Hallows' Eve', The Holy Evening, later shortened to 'Halloween'.

For many centuries, however, fear of the supernatural remained strong. During the Middle Ages, animal costumes and frightening masks were worn to ward off the evil spirits of darkness on Halloween. Magic words and charms were used to keep away bad luck, and everybody believed that witches ride about on broomsticks. Fortune telling was popular, and predicting the future by the use of nuts and apples was so popular that Halloween is still sometimes known as Nutcrack Night or Snap-Apple Night.

Today, Christians have learned to turn to prayer instead of charms to overcome the powers of darkness. And the deeper, true meaning of All Hallows' Eve, should not be forgotten. As Christians, we all draw closer to Christ when we remember and give thanks for our loved ones and for others who have gone before us through the gates of death.

The system also claims all gift aid, where authorised by the giver and passes it on to the parish the same month. This is much quicker and more convenient than the current standing order.

World Vision hopes that Pumpkin Heroes will help local churches to 'turn Halloween into a night of hope'. For the project, they have teamed up with Scripture Union, UCB and The Meaningful Chocolate Company in Pumpkin Heroes.



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
