# **Rev Liz writes**

# Dear all,

Last month I wrote about our mutual belonging both as members of this wonderful community and that of the wider community and family as God's church in this place. This month we once again look forward and celebrate the coming of God into our world through the birth of his son Jesus all those years ago into a small town to an ordinary young couple who were to become extraordinary in God's plan for humankind. Named as 'Emmanuel' in Matthew's gospel, through earlier prophecy, this means 'God is with us'. This is truly the ultimate in mutual belonging isn't it?



Well this month there is much to help us prepare for Christmas and beyond. As you read this the Christmas trees will be lighting the way up to church once again this

year and I hope many of you will come and join us at one of our many Christmas services. You will see the lighted Christmas trees illustrating our Christmas card which you should receive early this month outlining all the details. Please do also study the calendar of church services and events in this magazine though too!

We are hoping to deliver some Christmas hampers to any who are in need in the village so if you know of anyone who might enjoy a few Christmas treats please do let me know as soon as possible. For many, Christmas is a difficult time of year especially for those undergoing financial hardship and bereavement and it is lovely to know that others are thinking of you. The Christmas prayer tree will also be placed in church near the front, where you can write a prayer for yourself, for others or in remembrance of someone.

We once again welcome our donkeys to Capel as they help us act out the Nativity along with I hope lots of children. Costumes are supplied but do come ready dressed up if you wish! You can never have too many angels or shepherds or anything else for that matter! This will also be our gift service where we welcome wrapped gifts for those in need in the Brixton area. We have been sending gifts to them for many years now and they are so grateful for them so do drop them into church beforehand if it's more convenient or on the day!

For our traditional Carol service this year we are following a slightly different format with a narrator helping the story along, but there will be the usual selection of traditional carols and choir pieces to enjoy. Norman's mulled wine and Joy's mince pies will help us on our way after the service. This year Christmas Eve is on a Sunday so I have four services to do that day! Come and help me, either at 8 or 10am, the lovely Crib service at 4pm and the first communion of Christmas at 11pm. By midnight we will be ready to light candles and sing Silent Night as Christmas Day dawns. Then the big day when there will be one service only at 10 o clock, to which children and adults for that matter can share one of their Christmas presents with us and help us celebrate the birth of Jesus. And don't forget that on New Year's Eve you can put the past behind you and welcome in the New Year with our informal service of Café Church!

As we look forward to the beginning of 2018 you may recall that I have previously written that our church parish of Capel is planning to unite with St Margaret's Ockley, becoming a united parish but within the overarching care of The Surrey Weald Team. That process has now reached the time of public consultation and you will be able to see a copy of the draft Pastoral Scheme in the church porch. There is also a copy of a Notice about the scheme on the Notice board by the Lychgate. Anyone may make representations for or against all or any part or parts of the draft scheme and you will see how to do that on the displayed notices. In the meantime I am of course happy to talk to anyone about the proposed scheme. If there are no representations then we hopefully will be united early in the New Year which is a very exciting prospect and we wish our friends at Ockley peace and joy this Christmastime too!

# Dear Readers,

Well here we are at the end of the first year of producing InSpire each month! I hope very much that you are continuing to enjoy it. I try to fill it with a mix of information—both local and global, together with puzzles and humour! If there is anything you would like to see more of, please let me know on the feedback information form on page 23 of this issue. It can then either be emailed back to me or detached and left in a box which I shall put on the table just inside church? We very much want it to remain Free of charge if possible as it is an outreach resource both for ourselves, our friends at St Margaret's in Ockley and anyone that we all choose to give a copy to! Our dilemma is that it is currently costing approximately £40.00 a month for about 40-50 copies. Many have signed up to receive it electronically so that they can then print it out themselves and this of course DOES save us some money! Initially, I was able to



print it off at the Weald School where I had worked, but the copying was not of the best quality and with staff changes at the school, I no longer feel this is feasible. Our Treasurer Debbie has a suggestion which she outlines later in the magazine, whereby we might feel we could sponsor the cost of the printing of InSpire in the month of our birthday or that of a loved one? If you have any further thoughts on how we might fund this initiative, please do let either myself, Rev Liz or Debbie von Bergen know?

We are approaching Advent and the Season of Goodwill and I am warmed by the wonderful news that we are able to share with you of the fundraising that took place in November alone. We raised over £600.00 for The Children's Society who we support as a church, £130.00 for Traidcraft, £276.00 at the Remembrance Service for the Royal British Legion and over £371.00 for the Church Mission Society. This is not withstanding our weekly collections in church, the Art exhibition, the donations to the Foodbank and Leatherhead hostel. People are remarkably generous, especially when you consider that in the current financial climate many people around us even in our own village are suffering. I have no doubt that we will follow suit again in December, when it comes to donating presents to our friends in Brixton, donations to create hampers for local friends and neighbours that Rev Liz would like to give a hamper to and much more! Christ taught us about the importance of giving and just this one snapshot of our life in Capel and the fundraising in November alone, shows us that not only do we truly believe it but we embrace it too!

I went with Rev Liz to the Christian Resources Exhibition in Sandown Park recently and we both wanted to explore the exhibit by 'Compassion UK' whilst there. It was very moving as we followed the story of one young man's journey from childhood to becoming an adult with the benefit of sponsorship via Compassion UK. Liz and I were so moved by it that we both immediately sponsored a child. We have since received our Welcome Packs and I have today written to 'our child' Mayra in Mexico. I feel very privileged and honoured to be able to play just a small part in this little girl's life. Her life will be so different to mine growing up in leafy Surrey, and that of my own two sons', but my faith and that of Compassion UK encouraging us 'To Release children from poverty in Jesus' name' has brought Mayra and us together. We may never meet (I very much hope that somehow we do one day!), but I shall follow our sponsored child's life avidly over the next few years and have no doubt at all that giving to Mayra will bring me and the family, more pleasure than receiving a gift ever will. So as we all prepare for Christmas with the hectic card writing and posting, the wrapping of presents and the feasting on (far too much!) food and drink with our loved ones, I'm sure that we can reflect on others less fortunate than ourselves, both on our doorstep and abroad, and know that the act of giving, as Jesus taught us, brings far more lasting pleasure than the brief excitement and pleasure of a gift received.

It would only be right to reflect on those who have died this year too. We remember all those in our local community who have died in this last year and we remember their families and friends as they face their first Christmas without them. We hold them all in our prayers.

I wish you all a happy Christmas, spent with those you love and every blessing for 2018.

By Diana Hawkes, ex-Headteacher of Capel school If there is one thing I dislike, it's your usual primary school 'paper-winged angel' nativity play where the children stumble through adult words that they have learned parrot fashion and that contains no meaning for them. It's just a show for the parents. I was lucky enough to be Head of two C of E schools and each year we did a Christmas service. In my last school, we did it twice, once on Friday afternoon for an invited congregation of local senior citizens and then they came back into school to be served tea by the children and the second time in place of the usual Sunday morning service and then the congregation came back into school to be served coffee and mince pies by the PTA. Some weeks beforehand, I discussed with the top class how we would tell the story. One year we took the theme of Christmas customs showing what part of the Christmas story they represented. From all the children's written work I chose the best ones for them to read in the service. The readings were interspersed with carols sung by the school choir while children processed from different parts of the church to form a tableaux below the choir stalls. For example, Mary and Joseph would come first whilst the choir were singing "O Little Town of Bethlehem" or "Away in a Manger". Having to wait, unsupervised in a far corner of the church until it was their turn to move, was a very good lesson in self-discipline which was as important as the English they had learned in the writing! The children took the service entirely whilst the staff sat with the rest of the children not taking part. Everyone sang the first and last carols and our Vicar gave the blessing.

One year when I talked to the children to ask them if they had any ideas for the annual service,

one of the girls said "Why don't we do it from the point of view of the animals who were present?" which I thought was a very good idea. The girl concerned wrote a delightful piece from the point of view of a mouse in the stable. The other children chose an animal and one boy wrote as if he were a camel talking to one of the other camels as they plodded along day after day. I cannot remember it word for word after many years but it was something along the lines of "What's all this about a star? Why do we have to follow it day after day? When are we going to stop? I'm so tired and my feet are killing me!". Yes, the congregation laughed, just as you have done reading this, but not unkindly; for that



earthy "unexpected in a church service" remark made people think. When the congregation came out of church, that remark was still being discussed and made many realise that this was not just another story out of a book, but something real. They realised that the camel's innocent remark made them think about just how tired poor Mary must have been when she finally arrived, nine months pregnant and truly tired from all the journeying to get there.

Yes, it was definitely not your usual Nativity!

# **Traidcraft in our Church**

I have been selling Traidcraft items in our church at regular intervals since July 2014. Traidcraft<sup>®</sup> is an organisation that helps to promote farmers in Africa and Asia by selling their products. Amongst their many products are beverages and edible items such as tea, coffee, chocolate, biscuits, dried fruit and rice. Not everyone may be aware that Traidcraft also sell household items 'Clean & Fair' which includes rubber gloves, kitchen rolls, toilet rolls and cleaning products. There are also beautifully crafted clothing items and bedding. The cotton duvets and garments are extremely soft and hardwaring.

I receive catalogues at Spring, Autumn and Christmas time. If any one would like one to browse through I can happily supply one. The farmers who produce the products are operating at subsistence levels, often in remote parts of their country and by supporting them it helps alleviate poverty and builds communities. I buy stock and sell it at a ten per cent mark up price. The profit I make goes back into our church. Currently I sell approximately £1,000 of Traidcraft items each year and this therefore means that I can give £100 to church. In the supermarkets such as Marks and Spencer, Waitrose and I think Tesco's Fairtrade products can be seen. These are not the same

as **Traidcraft**<sup>®</sup>. Sainsburys is now trying to produce their own label of 'fairly traded ' goods. This undermines the work of Traidcraft. Sadly, it supports power at the top of such large organisations and takes control away from the local farmer. Traidcraft is a charity but is involved in the political campaign to bring fairer trade and justice in the world. I would like to thank everyone in Capel who buys their Traidcraft products from me!

# 6 December How Father Christmas got where he is today

One person you are bound to run into this Christmas season is Father Christmas. These days he seems to frequent shopping malls and garden centres. If he looks tired, just remember that he has been around a long time, and gone through a lot of transformations.

Father Christmas wasn't always the red-suited, white-bearded star of the retail trade that he is today. He began life as Nicholas, born way back about AD260 in Patara, an important port on the southern coast of what is now Turkey. When his parents died and left him a fortune, Nicholas gave it away to the poor. He became a bishop of the nearby city of Myra, where he almost certainly suffered persecution and imprisonment at the hand of the Roman Emperor Diocletian.

Nicholas was a serious theologian: he was a participant at the First Council of Nicaea, which formulated the Creed which we still say today. He even, reportedly, slapped another bishop in a squabble over the exact nature of the Trinity.



Nicholas died in Myra about AD343, but the stories of his generosity and kindness were just beginning. One enduring tale tells

of the three girls whom he rescued from certain prostitution by giving them gold for their dowries. When the father confronted him to thank him, Nicholas said he should thank God alone. In the UK, Nicholas became the basis for Father Christmas, who emerged in Victorian times as a jolly-faced bearded character. Meanwhile, Dutch and German settlers had taken him to America with them as Sinter Klaas and Sankt Nicklas. It was in America that Nicholas received his final two great breaks into real stardom. The first was when the Rev Clement C Moore, a New York Episcopal minister, turned from his life-work of writing a Hebrew/English lexicon, to write a fun poem for his children one Christmas. His 'The Visit of St Nicholas' is now universally known by its first line: 'T'was the Night Before Christmas'.

From Clement Moore we discovered that St Nicholas is round and pink-cheeked and white-bearded, and that he travels at night with sleigh, reindeer and a sack of toys on his back. It was Clement Moore who also revealed that St Nicholas enters houses down chimneys and fills children's stockings with toys and sweets. So how did we find out that Father Christmas wears red? That was the US Coca-Cola advertising campaign of 1931, who finally released the latest, up-to-date pictures of Father Christmas: wearing a bright red, fur-trimmed coat and a large belt. These days, it is good that Father Christmas uses reindeer and doesn't have to pay for petrol. In order to get round all the children in the world on Christmas Eve, he will have to travel 221 million miles at an average speed of 1279 miles a second, 6,395 times the speed of sound. For all those of us who are already exhausted just rushing around getting ready for Christmas, that is a sobering thought.



# Christmas: Was Jesus really born on 25<sup>th</sup> December?

Almost certainly not. But the story of how that date came to be chosen as his 'birthday' is one that stretches back long before his birth. It seems to have started on the Greek island of Rhodes in 283 BC. That year the solstice fell on 25<sup>th</sup> December, and it was also the year that the Ancient World's largest Sun God stature - the 34 metre, 200 tonne Colossus of Rhodes, was consecrated. By 46 BC, Julius Caesar had made 25<sup>th</sup> December the official winter solstice. In AD 274, the Roman Emperer Aureilian chose the winter solstice to be the birthday of the Sun God. He also decreed that Sol Invictus (the unconquered sun) was 'Lord of the Roman Empire'.

Fifty years after that, and Constantine had become the first pro-Christian Roman Emperor. He wanted the Church to celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ on

25<sup>th</sup>December. Perhaps it was that to him, Jesus was more or less the same person as the mighty Sun God. Or perhaps he felt that the ancient sun god's association with goodness, light, warmth and life would help ease the people's transition from paganism to Christianity. Whatever the reason, the Church went along with it, and chose 25<sup>th</sup> December to be the date of Christmas. And in an ancient mosaic in the crypt of St Peter's Cathedral, Jesus is portrayed as adorned with sun rays and riding in a chariot – just like Sol Invictus. As for the huge, bronze 200 tonne Sol Invictus? He fell over during an earthquake, and was sold off for scrap metal in 654AD by an enterprising Arab scrap merchant. Meanwhile, Jesus lives on...
