

Dear all,

This month, I am delighted to be able to tell you formally that we are now according to the new pastoral scheme for the parishes of Ewhurst, Forest Green, Okewood, Ockley and Capel, a united parish with St Margaret's Ockley under the auspices of the Surrey Weald Team of churches. From now on we are to be known as the parish of Capel and Ockley. The Church Commissioners received no objections to the scheme so were able to 'make it' on the 27th December 2017 and it came into effect on the 1st January 2018! This is great news. So what happens now you may ask? Well, you will see in our calendar of services and events that we are now obliged to bring forward what would have been the APCM in this parish in April so that it becomes a Special Parochial Church Meeting. That meeting will be first of two to be held in church on Sunday 11th February at 11.45am in which the main business is to as usual review the past year in church activities and those of the PCC plus an opportunity to review the annual accounts for the parish. That meeting will close the parish of Capel as it stands and will be immediately followed by another Special Parochial Church Meeting which will establish the new united parish of Capel and Ockley! So then we will be up and running!

You will also notice in the calendar that service times have changed slightly. For Capel the weekly Family Communion Service will now begin at 10.30am. The 8 o clock Book of Common Prayer service will now be held every two weeks instead of weekly. For any who may worry about this latter change, sadly numbers have fallen to well below an attendance of 10 regulars; in fact we are doing well if we can count 6! The service at St Margaret's Ockley will change to 9am instead of 9.30 and will continue to offer Matins and Holy Communion on alternate Sundays. When we have a fifth Sunday in the month which I believe happens 4 times a year then we shall worship together at one church and one service. If you are now totally confused remember this; as I told one of our regular 8 o clockers the other day, if you want Holy Communion just follow me!

So lots of change and adjustment as we settle down together as united parishes but change that will greatly benefit each church and village. We are certainly as congregations approaching our working together with great excitement and anticipation so lots to look forward to!

We are also pleased to offer a bit of an alternative to traditional church in the shape of something called Sunday Sessions which will be an informal gathering where we can relax and discuss pertinent issues for ourselves and our world clang with some mellow music and the world bin

world, along with some mellow music and thoughtful words in the form of poetry and prayer in our Capel Parish Hall on the 18th February at 6pm. Please do read more about it elsewhere in the magazine this month. Also, don't forget our Curry and Comedy evening on the 8th of this month, but if you would like to come, hurry if you haven't yet booked a ticket – we need numbers by the 4th of this month!

So, next month I shall be able to give you a review of the church's activities over this past 10 months at least and a taster of lots of good things to come. Till then, let us remember that in all of these things, in all of our lives, **God is with us. Allelulia!**

The Hymn Writers by Stuart Cole

John Henry Newman was born in 1801 and grew up in the Bloomsbury area of London. His father was a banker, and his mother was of French Huguenot descent. He was converted to evangelical Calvinist at the age of 15 and held that the Pope was the antichrist. After leaving school he obtained a BA in Classics from Trinity College Oxford, and became a fellow there in 1823. The following year he as ordained Deacon in Oxford, and held a number of positions in and around Oxford for the next few years. During this time he took part in a number of debates with dons and began to think of the Church as "a Divine appointment, and as a substantive body, independent of the State, and endowed with rights, prerogatives and powers of its own". In 1828 Newman was still nominally associated with the evangelical wing of the Church, although it is obvious from his associations and writings that he was leaning elsewhere. Two years later Newman had resigned from membership of the Bible Society and the Church Missionary Society, and it is probably these two events that stared his move away from the evangelical wing of the Church.

In 1832, Newman toured Southern Europe with Hurrell Froude. During this time Newman fell dangerously ill with fever and became convinced that God was calling him back for work in England. It was on the journey home that he wrote the poem Lead, Kindly Light which was later set as a hymn. It became popular during the First World War probably due to it never mentioning God, the doubts that it expresses, and its ambiguity.

Lead, kindly light, amid the encircling gloom, lead thou me on; the night is dark, and I am far from home; lead thou me on. Keep thou my feet; I do not ask to see the distant scene; one step enough for me.

Following his time in Rome, Newman became drawn to the high church tradition of Anglicanism having heard a sermon given by John Keble. This resulted in the start of the Oxford Movement where a group of Anglicans wished to return to many of the Catholic beliefs and rituals. He published "Tracts for the Times" until 1841, and eventually left to the Roman Catholic Church in 1845 with some of his followers. He became a Roman Catholic priest in 1846, and served in Birmingham from 1848 and, as he could not be appointed to a position at Oxford, became Rector at University College, Dublin.

At that time there was much antagonism towards the Roman Church and Newman not only published a number of articles, but also held public lectures regarding Catholicism .

In 1868 he published his poem Dream of Gerontius describing the journey of the soul to purgatory. This poem contains two other popular hymns, "Praise to the Holiest in the height" is sung by the Fifth Choir of Angels and "Firmly I believe and truly" sung by Gerontius soon after death. The Dream of Geronius was later set by Edgar Elgar in 1900.

Praise to the Holiest in the height, and in the depth be praise: in all his words most wonderful, most sure in all his ways.

Firmly I believe and truly God is Three and God is One; and I next acknowledge duly manhood taken by the Son.

Newman remained at Birmingham for the rest of his life. He continued to publish religious pamphlets and also republished much of his work as an Anglican. Despite him arguing against Papal infallibility, he was made a Cardinal in 1879 by Pope Leo XIII. Newman died at Birmingham in 1890. Editor: Nell Goddard of the London Institute for Contemporary Christianity considers what real friendship can mean.

Better is open rebuke than hidden love. Wounds from a friend can be trusted, but an enemy multiplies kisses. Proverbs 27:5-6

As iron sharpens iron, so one person sharpens another. Proverbs 27:17

I remember it really clearly: stood in the kitchen of my student house, clutching a cup of tea, and being told – in no uncertain terms – that I needed to be kinder with my words. The deliverer of this stark truth was someone I had met only once before, but who had been invited for dinner by one of my housemates.

In that moment, I knew three things.

- Firstly, I was cross. What right did this person have to offer up opinions and rebuke me when they'd only just met me?
- Secondly, they were right: I frequently used words as weapons rather than gifts, and they weren't the first person to call me out on it. But strangely enough they were the first person I listened to.
- Thirdly, we were going to be friends. This realisation surprised me, but I knew it with a deep certainty. And I was right three years later, they're one of my closest friends.

This story is a worked example of these proverbs, and an illustration of how friendship isn't meant to be consistently comfortable and cosy. True friendship does not shrink from correcting the friend – after all, iron cannot sharpen iron unless forceful contact is made.

These proverbs assume that a friend persists and does not shy away from constructive criticism. Such criticism is done in a way which is open and direct, remaining caring and completely concerned with the best interests of the addressee. Does this ring true for your friendships? Or does it present you with a challenge?

Friendship is a key part of life and so, for the Christian, a key part of discipleship. Through friendship, God teaches us about others, about community, and about Himself. After all, He is the God who calls us friend.

So, what does it mean to be a friend? Each friendship will take a different form, depending on the people engaging in it. Colleagues, family, fellow parents, study partners... wherever we are, whatever we're doing, friends will most likely play a part.


Friendships are significant, presenting us with opportunities for both evangelism and discipleship, as well as for learning more about God, and they are a part of life where we can see God working powerfully – in us and through us, every day.



14 Saint Valentine's Day

Saint Valentine's Day, many believe, was named after one or more Christian martyrs and was established by Pope Gelasius 1 in 496 AD. Valentine of Rome was martyred about 269, and this day usually 'belongs' to him.

The first recorded association of Valentine Day with romantic love (1382) is from Geoffrey Chaucer. He wrote, 'For this was Saint Valentine's Day, when every bird cometh there to choose his mate.' This poem was in honour of the first anniversary of the engagement of King Richard II of England to Anne of Bohemia. Valentine Day is referred to by Ophelia in Hamlet (1600-1601).

To-morrow is St Valentine's day All in the morning betime And I a maid at your window To be your Valentine.



The modern mention of Valentine's Day can be found in a collection of English nursery rhymes (1784):

The rose is red, the violet's blue The honey's sweet, and so are you. Thou are my love and I am thine I drew thee to my Valentine.





The Hawfinch in Capel Churchyard

These birds first appeared mid-October with flocks flying over the village daily, all heading west. During mid-December a few settled around the village and began feeding on blackthorn stones in the fields and also the yew berry stones that were in the Pub garden and church. The general theory is the has been a crop failure in Eastern Europe and this is why they have arrived here in such large numbers. They would normally feed on beech and hornbeam mast primarily.

There has been a large turnover in numbers with a max count of 46 on

the nature reserve last Sunday and to date I have ringed 28 birds about double the previous Surrey Ringing Totals.

I would estimate around 250 birdwatchers have enjoyed these birds since the new year.

It is worth noting Hawfinches can produce 150lb per square inch of pressure easily enough to crush cherry and blackthorn stones !

Historic churches and chapels are set to benefit from 'rescue funds'

The National Churches Trust, the UK's church buildings support charity, has given 93 churches on the Historic England 'At Risk Register' a total amount of £680,000.

Churches receiving grants include St Botolph, Boston Stump, in Boston, a Grade I listed church towering over the fens as a landmark to sailors and pilots; St James' in Burton Lazars, also Grade 1 listed, containing the grave of the Zborowski family, whose racing cars were the inspiration for Chitty Chitty Bang Bang; and St Mary de Castro, Leicester, also Grade I listed, and where King Richard III worshipped.

Huw Edwards, broadcaster and journalist and Vice President of The National Churches Trust says: 'At the heart of communities in cities, towns and villages, churches are a treasure trove of architecture, history and faith. I'm delighted that the future of these churches and chapels in England, Scotland and Wales is being safeguarded thanks to the National Churches Trust. 'The grants range from major repair funding boosts to help with maintenance and development projects.

The oldest Bible comes back to the UK

The world's oldest surviving complete Latin Bible returns to the UK this autumn. It left these shores for Rome 1302 years ago, when monks in the northeast of England sent it as a gift to Pope Gregory II.

The Codex Amiatinus was one of only three produced at the twin monasteries of Wearmouth and Jarrow. (One has since got lost, and the other survives in fragments.) It was kept safe for centuries at the Abbey of the Saviour in Monte Amiata, in Tuscany. Then in the 18th century it was sent to the Biblioteca Medicea Laurenziana, in Florence.

It is the Laurenziana which has now agreed to send it back to the UK, alongside the Lindisfarne Gospels, for its exhibition 'Anglo-Saxon Kingdoms', which begins in October.

The Bible is 12 inches thick, and weighs 35kg. It contains both Old and New Testaments, and was written on 1030 leaves made from the skins of at least 515 sheep. It has been called one of the greatest treasures of Anglo-Saxon times.

During this month Ash Wednesday and Valentine's Day, share the same date! It seems an odd mix, yet there is an obvious link: *love*! Lent, beginning on Ash Wednesday, is about learning how to love God more, as we give Him space in our lives. It's also an opportunity to reflect on Jesus' experience in the wilderness (Luke 4:1-13).

Jesus was led into the desert by the Spirit (1), where He was tempted by Satan, but demonstrated the path of real love. Jesus is tempted to turn stones into bread. Love gets to the heart of human need, not just satisfying physical desires. Satan tempts Jesus to worship him. However, worshipping God is the beginning of love and results in sacrificial service to meet the needs of others. Finally, He is tempted to put God to the test, by jumping off the Temple. Only real love can change hearts by practical love and care.


Lent teaches us how to live out the love of God in practice, as we follow Jesus in the way of the cross.

Valentine was Christ's follower, committed to sharing God's love with others. We know little about him, except that he was a priest who lived in the 3rd Century AD and was martyred on February 14th. Emperor Claudius felt that soldiers in the Roman Army were distracted from their duty by their wives, and so attempted to outlaw marriage. It is believed that Valentine married couples in secret. He also helped Christians in Rome during times of persecution. He demonstrated the importance of showing real love in action.

In trying to understand the meaning of her revelations from God, Julian of Norwich found:

'What, do you wish to know your Lord's meaning in this thing? Know it well, love was his meaning.'

Aspects of romantic love

God obviously approves of romance – after all, putting Adam and Eve alone together in the Garden of Eden was His idea. And romance – love between a man and a woman - has been around ever since.

The history of the Israelites began with three great romances: Abraham and Sarah. Isaac and Rebekah. Jacob and Rachel. The on-going history of Israel was deeply affected by later romances: Esther and King Xerxes, David's love affair with Bathsheba, and Solomon's marriage to hundreds of foreign wives. There is even an entire book in the Old Testament devoted to the love of a man and woman: the Song of Solomon!

When we reach the New Testament, we find real love between Joseph and Mary (even when Joseph thought Mary had been faithless, he did not want to harm her). St Paul, though himself a bachelor, nevertheless spent a lot of time urging Christians to love and be kind and faithful and considerate to their spouses. He even wrote 1 Corinthians 13 – the great love chapter that is read at millions of weddings worldwide 2000 years later.

Down the centuries ever since, romantic love has been critical in shaping history (Anthony and Cleopatra), in shaping cultural ideals (King Arthur and the Knights of the Round Table). Some of our favourite stories are built on romance. (Puccini's *Tosca*, Shakespeare's *Romeo and Juliet*, Jane Austen's *Pride and Prejudice*, Charlotte Bronte's *Jane Eyre*).

Romance remains as prominent now as it ever was, added to which we have films, television and drama all flying the romantic flag. Think of *Titanic, Mama Mia, Love, Actually,* to name but a few. Wherever we look, whatever we do, romance continues to permeate every aspect of life.

The old adage that 'love makes the world go round' is irrefutable – and it also seems to make the galaxies go round, too. (Think of the Star Wars films).

Certainly, romance is alive and well – last year in Britain we spent about one billion pounds on Valentine's Day, sending each other cards, flowers, presents, and going out to restaurants.

And what of the future? Well, just as the Bible begins with a love story, so it ends with one. And *you are involved*! For actually the greatest Love Story of all time is that between God and His people.

Christ is described in Revelation as our heavenly Bridegroom, and the Church is His beloved Bride. He has given us the most expensive present of all – Himself. And, just as in all the best romances, the story will end with the bride and groom together at last, so at the End of Time, Christ will return for His Bride.


