Rev Liz writes

It's getting to that time of the year when some people's thoughts are turning to holidays and with that in mind I would like to draw your attention to a very special sort of holiday that our parish is planning for Autumn 2020. It is some years since there was a pilgrimage to any of the Holy sites in Israel or the Mediterranean and so we have invited someone who has been leading tour groups to the Holy Land or as he puts it 'The land of the Holy one' for over 30 years. His name is Haydon Wilcox and he is an ordained priest in the Church of England. The pilgrimage will be 12 days in all visiting Jerusalem, Bethlehem, the Judean Desert and the region of the Dead Sea, Samaria, The Galilee and Northern Israel. The trip will be very much focussed on listening to the many different voices in The Holy Land and experiencing the diverse culture in Jerusalem. We will be experiencing contrasts between the different districts in the city, Hasidic, Arab and secular plus meeting with the Palestinian community. We shall celebrate Shabbat and learn about the issues of the Palestinian Christian Church and its relationship with Muslims and Jews. We will learn about the views of orthodox Jews and meet a representative of the Samaritan community. This is an exciting opportunity to visit Israel and to hear different views about the extremely complex situation that the Holy Land finds itself in. We will be visiting lots of holy and historical sites but we would like to stress that this is not a trip just for Christian pilgrims. Anyone of any belief or none is very welcome to join us. Haydon will be coming to Capel to the Parish Hall (just behind the Capel Memorial Hall) on July 2^{nd} to give us further information, show pictures and to discuss possible options for accommodation and the itinerary. By coming along to the information evening you are not committing or being expected to commit to travelling with us next year. Most I expect will wish to go away and think about it!! So do come and find out more on the 2nd July at 7.30pm next month.

It is also getting to that time of the year when we have like many of you been putting extra effort into our garden. Yes, it's Vicarage Fete time again! This year our very creative and efficient team are planning all sorts of exciting things for this traditional annual event. New attractions this year will be a carousel and



The vicar's attempts to increase the

number of children attending services

A Visit to Lancing College Chapel

In mid May a number of us from Ockley and Capel visited the Chapel at Lancing College with Dr John Ashwood as the guide to his old school. Norman Ede kindly drove us all down there in a coach. The chapel dominates the skyline outside Shoreham off the A283, and is said to be the fourth highest in the country. The school was founded by Revd Nathaniel Woodard who was the curate at Shoreham.

Nathaniel Woodard was born on 21 March 1811 at Basildon Hall in Essex. He was educated by his mother and by 1834 had entered Magdalen Hall, Oxford where he married and eventually completed his degree in 1840. He had been brought up as an evangelical but at Oxford he became interested in the Tractartarian movement and became an Anglo-Catholic and this can be seen in the architecture of the chapel. Soon after leaving Oxford he was ordained s a curate in Bethnal Green. He started a church school for the local poor children, but was moved to another parish in Clapton after preaching that The Book of Common Prayer should include separate provision for confession and absolution at St. James the Greater, Clapton near Stratford in London. It is hard to believe today the disruption that the Tractarians caused in the Church at the time and that a priest would be moved because of a sermon, but much of our worship today has its roots from that time including Hymns Ancient and Modern. By 1846, he had moved to St Mary de Haura at New Shoreham, where he was again hit by the poverty and the lack of education amongst middle class parishioners. He

considered many to be less educated than many of those that they employed who had been educated in the parish school.

He started a school at the vicarage and in 1848 he opened the boarding school of St Nicolas'. These were merged a year later to form the College of St Mary and St Nicolas which eventually became Lancing College. Within two years he had left the full-time priesthood to work full time on educational projects. His educational work was recognised by the award of a Doctorate of Civil Law by Oxford, and by his appointment as a Canon of Manchester Cathedral. This appointment brought with it a large salary which he put towards funding his schools. In total he and his supporters raised half a million pounds (equivalent to nearly £65 million today) by the time of his death in 1891. Apparently he would invite potential donors for dinner and then not let them leave until they had made a donation to his schools.

He started building the college chapel in 1868, but he was not to see the chapel completed in his own lifetime. In fact, it is still not completed but the school did worship in the crypt from 1875 when that was completed. His aim for the school was the provide education to the middle classes based on "sound principle and sound knowledge, firmly grounded in the Christian faith". This Christian faith in his time was very much the "Catholic faith, as it is expressed in the Book of Common Prayer" as he had no time for non conformists or low church Anglicans. He started a total of 11 schools and took over many others. Today his legacy lives on in the Woodard Schools comprising 16 independent schools, 6 academies and 21 affiliated schools (independent, state and international). All run on his philosophy of providing education in an actively Christian environment.

Despite not being completed the chapel is magnificent. It is dedicated to Saints Mary and Nicolas, and the building reflects his belief in the educational value of "correct buildings". He employed RC Carpenter as the architect of the college and he was succeeded by his son and William Slater who completed the design of the chapel.

Lancing College Chapel is well worth a visit. It is open daily 10am to 4pm and on Sundays and Bank Holidays 12 noon to 4 pm.

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The design is early French Gothic. It stands 330 feet high on foundations 70 feet deep and built from Sussex sandstone. It was originally intended to have a 350 foot tower, but this was never built due to the cost at the time. Although the crypt was used from 1875 it was not until 1911 that the main chapel was consecrated. Even then the building was not complete and the west end, when John was there, was still temporary corrugated iron. This was replaced in 1978 with a new west wall and rose window (the largest in England at 32 feet in diameter) funded by the Friends of Lancing Chapel. But still the west end is not finished with the sandstone abruptly finished with rough bricks. The Friends are determined to complete a porch to finally finish the chapel.

In the new entrance there is a stain glass window in honour of Archbishop Trevor Huddlestone, a former pupil of Lancing who campaigned relentlessly against apartheid in South Africa. It was dedicated by his friend Archbishop Desmond Tutu. From



there you enter the nave and the first impression is one of enormous height. It is like walking into a bright and airy Westminster Abbey. Light seams to come in from everywhere and is reflected off the light sandstone walls and the white chalk ceilings. The floor is Portland stone salvaged from a wreck off Shoreham. The canopies over stalls at the side of the nave were given to the chapel by Eton College and were designed by Gilbert Scott who led the gothic revival and was responsible for the Midland Hotel at St Pancras.

The high altar commemorated the second millennium with a silver cross made in 1490 in Toledo. Behind the altar are three tapestries which were a replacement for the planned reredos. They are based upon the patron saints of many of the Woodard Schools. These were woven at Merton Abbey on a loom built by William Morris who was a major contributor to the revival of traditional British textile arts and methods of production during the Arts and Crafts Movement.

There are also a Lady Chapel and the St Nicolas Chapel in the north and south aisles respectively. The height of both are accentuated by the length of the aisles which is the full length of the chapel. The aisle of St Nicolas Chapel has the White Ensign of HMS King Alfred which used the school as a training establishment during the Second World War.

The chapel has two organs, the original one at the west end in the gallery and a newer one next to the choir stalls which had an inaugural recital by Carlo Curley who also gave a concert on the Caple electronic organ.

On an interesting note—our friend Ron Backhouse was the Verger of the chapel before he retired and moved to Capel with his wife!

Friends of St Margaret's



Formally the Trust Deed of the friends states that "The Charity is established to advance the Christian religion by the restoration, preservation, repair, maintenance, improvement and beautification of the Church of St Margaret's, Ockley in the Diocese of Guildford (hereinafter called "the Church") and of the monuments, fittings, fixtures, stained glass, furniture, ornaments and chattels in the Church and Churchyards belonging to the Church"

St Margaret's Church is one of two churches in the parish of Capel and Ockley, a relatively small parish in the south of Surrey near to the border with Sussex. The parish came into existence in January 2018 when the former parish of Ockley, Okewood and Forest Green was dissolved. Okewood and Forest Green have been amalgamated with the Parish of Ewhurst whilst Ockley has been merged with the Parish of Capel. The new Parish of Capel and Ockley has a total population of around 3100.

The Church of St Margaret's Ockley requires significant sums to maintain and although those who regularly worship there contribute huge sums to the maintenance of the churches as well as the ministry, the burden of maintaining our heritage should not fall only on those who go to church. We therefore aim to encourage others to give generously to help maintain the church for future generations.

Parts of the present building have been with us for some 700 years – let's make sure they are there for another 700 years.

Friends Of St. John The Baptist Church, Capel

The "Friends Of St. John The Baptist Church, Capel" were formed on March 12th 1991 to raise money in times of need to maintain and improve the fabric of our 12th century Church, which stands at the centre of the village. The Friends are a registered Charity (Reg No 1002376).

"Friends" represents not only church-goers but also members of the local community who take a keen interest in its history, up-keep of the village and maintenance of its buildings.


Over the years contributions have been made to roof repairs both to the west porch and the north aisle. Also the path was re-laid. Internal improvements to the toilet and kitchen brought the church up to modern standards. Income is predominantly derived from two sources. Firstly, the fantastic "tea ladies" produce and serve Sunday teas in the church throughout the summer and autumn and well into winter. Capel Teas have a reputation far and wide and have become part of the local scene and add greatly to village social life. Dates for this year are displayed on our website.

Secondly, every year there is the annual <u>Capel Classic Car & Bike Show</u> which attracts around 650 exhibits from all over the south of England – see full details on the hyperlink. This has now been "twinned" with the Capel Horticultural Annual Show. It's a great day out for all the family. Over the years these two combine have come to be largest village show in Surrey. A great display of community spirit.



God in the Arts

The National Gallery at Trafalgar Square in London houses one of the finest collections of European paintings in the world, with some 2,300 works spanning the centuries. During this year we are journeying through the gallery to explore one of those treasures each month. Written by the Revd Michael Burgess.

'Beach scene' by Degas

'Mindfulness' seems to be the 'in' word. In a world where people are moving faster and faster, we are called to slow down, to attend to the present moment and enjoy it for its own sake, whatever the pressures of work and family around. For Christians it is a call to live a simple and sacramental life, and an invitation to attend to what is holy there in front of us: it might be a meal, the countryside, a piece of music, family and friends, a pet or a painting. They are all avenues for God's refreshing grace to touch us.

In this month of July we are probably planning our holidays. It may be in this country or abroad. Sometimes a holiday can be a frenetic rush of journeying and queues, or it can be a 'mindful' time, when we can relax and allow the days to refresh and renew us. Degas has captured that sense of rest and enjoyment in his painting of 1870 which is in the National Gallery: 'Beach Scene.'

He is famous for his studies of ballerinas and racehorses, but he was also fascinated by the advent of the snapshot camera. This painting is like a holiday photograph. We see a maid combing the hair of a young girl. Her hat and swimming costume are nearby, and we can see bathers in the distance where the shore meets the sea. Families and a dog, yachts and a steamer: they are all captured in this moment.

The sky looks misty but warm, and for those on the beach, it is a time to lie and relax, to bathe and swim – to live simply, enjoying the sun above and the sand beneath. The ordinariness of a restful day calls us to be patient and enjoy the good gifts of God's creation. Wherever we are on holiday this summer, I hope we find time to savour the delights of the world around, as we see young and old doing exactly that in this painting.

At several music festival events teams of Festival Angel volunteers will be on hand to offer welfare and support to ensure that those attending have a safe and fun festival experience.

Festival Angels started life as a Prayer Cafe, run by local church communities, at Leeds Festival in 2011. The Prayer Cafe at Leeds is now one of the most popular spaces at the festival with a £5 mug deal giving festival-goers a souvenir mug and free tea, coffee and hot water refills for the duration of the event. The Leeds team also run the Lost Property and Left Luggage tent, with a success rate of around 60% items returned to owners. Detached teams, very much like Street Angels in town and city centres, offer support and welfare across the massive festival site.

The success at Leeds has meant that other coordinators wanted Festival Angels at their own festivals. This year Festival Angels will be at over 12 music festival events including Boardmasters, Royal Ascot, Eastern Electrics and, for the first time this year, Kendal Calling where teams will run campsite safe hubs.

Festival Angels will also include the trendy 'Jesus Loves Festivals' banner design which is a great conversation starter and 'selfie with Jesus' opportunity! The teams are also promoting 'Jesus calls will you follow' banner plane flypast that will pass over all the festival sites.

My oldest son, Reverend Kevin Mullins, currently pastors Broad River Church in Norwalk, Connecticut, which is only 60 miles from Guilford! We have been so excited to learn about the pastors (of which there are many) that are our forefathers in both faith and natural heritage.

Wonder and Worship: Reflections in a Scottish Rainforest

It can be easier to notice things away from home, when we are relaxed and surrounded by unfamiliar sights in an exotic location. But sometimes the same wonders are there in our own back yard. GK Chesterton was a great advocate of intensive observation, and he invited his readers to take a fresh look at things that might be taken for granted. The rewards for this mental adjustment are great, and can feed into our worship in new ways.

I first learned to appreciate old growth forests on the West coast of Canada: the centuries-old tangle of logs and underbrush, and thick layers of moss and lichen, that provide rich resources for countless organisms. Several years later, in Scotland, I stumbled over a few acres of birch and hazel, lush with moss and ferns, and humming with insect and bird life. Fallen logs lay everywhere, vegetation grew up the trees, creepers hung down, and sunlight slanted through clearings.

I later discovered that this patch of woodland is one of the few remaining areas of old growth Atlantic rainforest, so I visited one sunny morning when I had more time to linger. The wood is home to 140 species of lichen and 100 of moss, so I found myself looking very closely at tree trunks and boulders. Each lichen is a unique relationship between a fungus and a particular collection of single-celled algae – an example of the collaboration that is so essential to every ecosystem.

Places like this are worth preserving, respecting, and appreciating as much as a work of art or a historic city. I'm so grateful to the community that chose to preserve it, and the Creator who used such intricate and patient processes to create it. As the animals and plants around me did what comes to them naturally, I did what I was made for - thanking God for everything I saw. I found myself praising God alongside all those species of lichen, moss and trees. "Let everything that has breath praise the Lord" (Psalm 150).

There is a growing call to take both our personal devotions and our church services outside from time to time, and there are a growing number of resources to help us do this. As you go through your week, can you find one new way to appreciate your surroundings, and praise God alongside the rest of creation?

Church of England Alexa skill asked 75,000 questions in first year

A year after its launch, the Church of England's award-winning Alexa skill has been asked more than 75,000 questions, according to recent data. The smart speaker skill was originally launched with prayers, explanations of the Christian faith and details of where to find the nearest church for local events and services based on location.

The data also reveals a trend of highest numbers of people using the skill in the evening. As a result of this, the Church's Digital and Church House Publishing teams added a wider range of mealtime, evening and night prayers during the year.

More family prayers have also been added, and integration improved with <u>A Church Near You</u>, the national church finder tool, to show maps of where the nearest church is. A range of videos have also been added to bring the Christian faith to life and showcase the social action work of churches across the country.

In a typical week people ask the following questions by topic area: Read today's daily 'EasterPilgrim' reflection -16%Say a prayer -40%Explore the Christian faith -31%Share a grace before a meal -6%Where is my local church? -7%.

The skill is average 4.2 out of five stars on the Alexa store, with comments such as "Love it - great example to the kids on how to pray".

The Archbishop of York, Dr John Sentamu, said: "The aim of the Alexa skill is to help users to know more of the love of Jesus Christ, to enable regular churchgoers and those exploring faith to connect with God in another way and at a time that's right for them."

Adrian Harris, Head of Digital at the Church of England, said: "We are pleased with the levels of engagement in the first year of launching the skill, which was built in just three months in 2018." The skill has also been recognised at a number of leading digital industry awards.

One in four people in debt were born into money struggles

A recent report by Christians Against Poverty (CAP), called *Changing Perceptions* has revealed that the financial problems of parents can have a profound effect on their children's future relationship with money. More than one in four of CAP's current clients grew up in a household badly affected by debt.

It seems that money worries are an 'intergenerational anxiety'. The report says that the "impact debt has on these children is far reaching, from taking a toll on their emotional wellbeing, to parents being unable to provide adequate food or clothing and feeling that their debt was affecting their children's future life chances. Where parents are struggling to provide for their children, feelings of guilt and shame are particularly acute."


Chief Executive Matt Barlow said: "When you've grown up with debt as the backdrop, it takes a huge leap of imagination to believe that life can be different. There's also no one to show you the right way to prioritise, plan ahead or even talk about finances."

Low income is the most common reason for personal debt. The average household annual income is £12,361 and a third of those being helped are living on less than £10,000 per household, per year.

Winchester Cathedral's Mortuary Chests Unlocked

The secrets hidden within Winchester Cathedral's mortuary chests are gradually being unlocked as part of an ongoing research project supported by the Dean and Chapter of Winchester Cathedral.

It has long been believed that the six mortuary chests contain the mortal remains of pre-Conquest kings and bishops, but for many years this has merely been the subject of speculation. A major development in 2015 revealed that the bones were from the late Anglo-Saxon and early Norman periods, thanks to radiocarbon (C14) dating on selected fragments by the Radiocarbon Accelerator Unit at the University of Oxford.

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Book Reviews

Walking with Pain

By John Elliston, Kevin Mayhew, £2.99

Pain is inseparable from the human condition. For some it becomes a constant companion with whom an unequal battle is fought. The author explores the phenomenon of pain and places the whole into the context of belief in a loving God. Christian theologians have grappled with the existence of pain, and Christianity has at its centre the Cross. The prayers and Scripture readings concentrate on the rawness of pain and the emotions, rather than the intellectual side of it. Those who have to live with pain struggle more with disbelief, grief, doubt, anger, 'why me?' feelings, not the intellectual.

Neither Bomb Nor Bullet: Benjamin Kwashi, the Archbishop they just couldn't kill By Andrew Boyd, Monarch, £9.99

In the warzone that Nigeria has become, Archbishop Ben Kwashi has survived three assassination attempts. A brutal assault on his wife, Gloria, drove him to his knees – to forgive and find the strength to press on. Islamist militants have Nigeria in their sights. These are the terrorists who kidnapped hundreds of Christian schoolgirls – who have vowed to turn Africa's most populous nation into a hard-line Islamic state. Their plan is to drive the Christian minority from the north by kidnapping, bombing and attacking churches. Plateau State is on the frontline.

But holding that line against Boko Haram, and standing firm for the Gospel, is Ben Kwashi, the Anglican Archbishop of Jos. In Jos, churches have been turned into fortresses and Archbishop Ben now conducts more funerals than weddings and baptisms put together. Yet his faith grows ever more vibrant. He has adopted scores of orphans who live in his home, including many who are HIV positive. And the challenge of his message – to live for the Gospel even in the face of terror – has never been so timely.

God Loves Me Always

By Make Believe Ideas, Authentic, £8.99

An inspirational collection of stories to teach children how God can help them handle their emotions. Each story explores a particular emotion: sadness, happiness, fear and anger. The stories are written in clear, simple text and are brought to life with beautiful illustrations. Included with each story is a page of information for parents which includes questions to ask children to engage them more deeply with each new emotion, as well as Bible quotes to prompt thought and discussion. A sticker sheet and reward chart are also included at the back of the book to reinforce lessons learnt.



Retired and Inspired: making the most of our latter years By Wendy Billington, BRF, £8.99

This book is a Christian view of retirement. Attitudes to retirement vary, and in this book Wendy Billington draws on her pastoral skills and life experience to ask the question: what is a Christian view of retirement?

Holy Days or Holidays?

Some porters were hired to carry a group's possessions on a trip through the jungle. The pace quickly increased until the head porter called a halt: 'We've come so far, so fast we need to take a break and allow our souls to catch up with our bodies!'

How often do we feel like this? July is a month when many of us take a break. Jesus and His disciples often took time to withdraw from the crowds: 'because so many people were coming and going that they did not even have a chance to eat, He said to them, 'Come with Me by yourselves to a quiet place and get some rest.' (Mark 6: 31,32).

Jesus saw how tired and stressed His disciples were and wanted to give them a break from their busy lives. He loved them and cared about their wellbeing. He longs to do the same with us, so we can restore the balance of work, rest and play in our lives. Going on holiday or taking time off gives us an opportunity of letting go the burdens of everyday life and renewing our rest in Him. This enables us to entrust Jesus with our issues and concerns, as we take time aside declare a holy day or holiday!

The story is told of the aged Apostle John playing with doves. A passing hunter expressed surprise at what a man as pious as John was doing. John pointed to the bow in the hunter's hand and asked him why he carried it with a loosened string. The hunter replied, 'it loses its strength unless it is given the chance to unbend'. John replied, 'why are you surprised that a servant of Christ should not relax to keep himself stronger for his work?'

The Way I See It: warfare, yes, but also mercy

75 years ago, as a choirboy, I remember thinking that lots of our hymns were about war. Not the one we were fighting in Europe, but a cosmic battle between good and evil. Christians were to put on their armour, pick up the sword of the spirit and fight with the 'God of battles' until 'every foe was conquered.'

This was, of course, the language of the Victorian hymns which filled our hymn books, and it was a spiritualised version of the 19th century scenario. Britannia ruled the waves. 'God who made thee mighty, Make thee mightier yet.' The conflict reflected in the hymns was not of armed warfare but of spiritual equivalent. But it was nevertheless all about winning and conquest.

It's true, of course, that in the eternal struggle between good and evil Christians are not neutral, but to me, the language of warfare seems inappropriate to follow the One who told us to love our enemies.

One Victorian hymn writer expressed a different view in the hymn 'There's a Wideness in God's Mercy.' It warns of our adopting a 'strictness' which God 'would not!' His love is broader than ours – judging human failures 'kindly' and urging us to make our love 'more simple.'

The author/poet in question was F.W. Faber and this hymn is worth a quiet read. Linked to a beautiful new tune, it has become popular on TV and radio. For me, its message is a helpful balance to those hymns of moral strife. Both are true, but in our present-day world I think Faber has the edge.

Our clergy are under stress

"The hardest work I have ever done and the most stressful." That was how Archbishop Justin Welby described his time as a vicar. "It was isolated, insatiably demanding, and I was, on the whole, working without colleagues. That wears people down."

Stress, anxiety and other mental health issues account for one-third of all clerical sickness, according to a study conducted for St Luke's Healthcare for the Clergy. This was recognised by every one of the Bishops I consulted for this article. Bishop Robert Paterson told me that stress was frequently caused by the relentless pressure on the diary of conscientious clergy, saying: "If only they would discuss this pressure with their key laypeople, who are aware that we are all only human."

Another retired Bishop looked critically at the advertisements for vacant parochial posts compiled by PCCs, saying they listed too many activities, paid insufficient attention to the core functions like pastoral care and Baptisms, Weddings and Funerals, and left little time for prayer and study. A common concern was the amalgamation of numerous parishes with just one priest, which has been common in rural areas and is now increasingly the practice in towns, so that clergy are often rushing from church to church, with little time to spend with the worshipping communities.


Sensitive laypeople who are familiar with this syndrome will take on as many of the administrative and pastoral responsibilities as they can. I know a couple in a multi-parish Benefice which has had no priest for some years, who organise a rota of retired clergy for Sunday services and visit parents who want their children Christened. In many parishes, it's churchwardens, sacristans and other volunteers who keep churches going. And that's how it should be.

With an increasing number of part-time and self-supporting clergy, most with families and some with a full-time job outside the parish itself, laypeople can come into their own. Visiting bereaved neighbours doesn't require a degree in counselling, and you don't need to be ordained to compile a parish magazine or newssheet if you have access to a computer and some enthusiastic amateur reporters. There are hidden talents in every parish, which means some of God's gifts aren't being used.

Finally, a heartfelt plea, please don't phone the vicarage after 8 o'clock in the evening, unless it's an extreme emergency.

To close with a quote from one Archdeacon, advising laypeople on how to treat clergy in danger of stress: "Remember your vicar is human, carrying burdens as well as joys - just like you. Make sure your priest has space and opportunity to keep faith and vision fresh and enlivened - again, just like you."

When Torch Trust was born 60 years ago, a vision burned to see God's Word in action, to enable all with sight loss



to be fully able to play their part in a Christian community and to grow in faith.

From humble beginnings in 1959, and a family motivated by their love both for God and people living with sight loss, a community grew; extending God's love, providing support and employment for many with sight loss and those called into this ministry.

250 people daily in the UK receive a diagnosis of sight loss. The impact on their sight – and everything else - is life-changing and a challenge that deserves a kingdom response, ensuring that isolation and loneliness is not the reality in Christian communities, although so often this is the case.

Today's reality for Torch Trust is an established ministry. Chair of trustees, singer songwriter Marilyn Baker, who is without sight, champions the cause which sees Christian literature made available in accessible formats(large print, audio and braille); over 80 friendship groups established throughout the UK; holidays and retreats in our centre at Hurstpierpoint near Brighton, and partnerships with organisations across the globe from Malawi to Australia.

The humble heart remains, with a renewed and God-inspired vision for the future.

Torch's time of celebration will mark the official launch of their Sight Loss Friendly Church initiative. Torch wants to connect with 50,000 churches across the UK; equipping them with resources and free expert advice, ensuring that every person living with sight loss is provided with the opportunity to grow in faith. Torch's website and team of advisors offer online resources, training and workshops, to help churches include all with sight loss.

The recent initial launch had a positive response, with more than 40 churches signing up in two weeks.


