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The Editor: With our visit from Pastor Mike Mullins on Sunday 1st September, I now enclose a brief history of Henry Whitfield who was the Vicar of St Margaret's, Ockley before leaving for the United States in 1639. If anyone has more detailed history connected with Rev Whitfield and the history associated with him, please do let me know so we can produce a more in depth article.

Henry Whitfield

Henry Whitfield, one of Guilford's founders and first minister, is estimated to have been born sometime between June 8 and October 1, 1592 in Greenwich in the English county of Kent. Thomas Whitfield, his father was a lawyer in London and his mother, Mildred Manning, was descended from the family of the poet and "Father of English literature" Geoffrey Chaucer. Whitfield attended New College, Oxford, where he befriended the future founder of the Saybrook colony in Connecticut, George Fenwick.

He initially studied law, but found it undesirable and promptly changed his focus to ministry studies. Whitfield was ordained a minister of the Church of England in 1618 and soon took up the post of vicar of St. Margaret's Church in Ockley, Surrey, where he remained for the next 18 years. During this time, he married Dorothy Shaeffe (also of Kent) and fathered nine children, living off the estate of his father. Henry Whitfield statue in Guilford, Connecticut



However, under the rule of King Charles I, the Church of England began to persecute Separatists and Puritans who opposed the new firm rule of the church and called for reform. Whitfield's sympathies soon shifted to the Puritan

movement following the persecution led by Archbishop William Laud. Shortly after being censured as a dissident by the High Commission Court in 1638, Whitfield resigned from his post in Ockley and recruited twenty five families, mostly farmers of Surrey and Kent, to travel to the New Haven colony.

Upon arrival in June 1639, Whitfield consulted Fenwick and Rev. John Davenport, founder of the New Haven Colony, and decided to purchase land from the Menunkatuck Indians halfway between the New Haven and Saybrook colonies. Whitfield and his party moved into the new Guilford colony in September of that year and immediately began construction of his house, though it was not finished until the following spring due to the winter weather conditions.

In the early years of the Guilford colony, Whitfield served as both the minister and community leader, delivering sermons and conducting marriage ceremonies as well as settling civil disputes. However, in 1650 Henry Whitfield returned to England, leaving his wife and the majority of his children in Guilford. It has been speculated that he returned due to the changed political and religious atmosphere for Puritans under the reign of Oliver Cromwell. Whitfield was reinstated in the Church but died in 1657, soon after his return, and was buried in Winchester Cathedral on 17th September.

It is worth remembering that, after costs, all the monies raised from stall holders fees, entry charges, etc go to help local charities (this year the Capel Pre-school and Scott Broadwood) and St John the Baptist Church in Capel. Local organisations also have the opportunity to fundraise. Some run raffles and tombolas, whilst others provide food and beverage. In due course we will report the total raised.

Congratulations to all the winners of the horticultural cups and medals. Especially Sam Jenks for winning the Tyrell-Evans Cup, National

Vegetable Society Medal and the Venitt Rose Bowl. Robert Astrop for winning the Banksian Medal, Tom Foreman Dahlia Cup and the Wilding Silver Cup. Julia Forsyth for winning the RHS Bronze Medal, National Dahlia Society Silver Medal and the Silliman Cup.

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George Ede's Story continued ...

George's story – chapter 2

So much has happened since I wrote last month – and so much progress has taken place. Many of you will have seen me in church in August and at the local village shows in both Okewood Hill and Capel. It has been such a joy to be back in the community and to receive such a welcome from so many of you.

When I last wrote I had recently moved to Ascot Rehabilitation in Bagshot. This was to be a time of intensive therapy (and weight gain!). The facility was very pleasant, the staff were superb and the food was fantastic!

I had sessions with Physiotherapists, Occupational Therapists and the Neuropsychologist six days per week with up to 5 x 1 hour sessions per day. Being further away from home and now into holiday season meant that visitors were fewer but I was kept busy with the therapy sessions, exercises and rest periods. That's not to say I didn't get out and explore the area! I discovered a few good local restaurants, the huge garden centre and café nearby, Savill Garden and the delights of afternoon tea at Pennyhill Park Hotel!!

One of my early goals at Ascot Rehabilitation was to stop using the wheelchair indoors and to be proficient on my crutches. This was soon achieved. With one of the lifts in the building out of action the need to master the stairs became all the more important. This had always been a personal goal of mine for being able to go home. Stairs were to become a regular feature of each day as the therapy rooms and gym were one or two floors below my bedroom. I was also taken into the garden where I had to negotiate uneven and sloping ground underfoot which was a lot harder to master than the smooth even surfaces inside.

One of the highlights of the Ascot Rehab facilities was the hydrotherapy pool. On 31st July I had my first session in the water. As a lover of swimming, the feeling of total immersion in water was bliss. The buoyancy provided by the water enabled me to perform exercises which had been very difficult in the gym. I was also able to walk in the waist deep water unaided. This was the first time in over 16 weeks that I had walked on my own!

My left leg and foot received much attention from the physios at Ascot as I still don't have full sensation due to the nerve damage. They have been massaged, stimulated and worked a lot. I am told that nerve damage can take up to 2 years to heal so there is still a way to go yet.

On Saturday 3rd August I was allowed to come home overnight to see how I could manage in my own surroundings. The stairs practice paid off and I was able to see the upstairs of our house for the first time in months. I spent the night in my own bed and was able to enjoy some family time (and a pile of ironing!).

My Occupational Therapy sessions were to include cooking and I was delighted to be able to arrange that I cooked and decorated Joseph's 20th birthday cake ready for his big day on 14th August which was also to be the day I finally came home! In order to bake the cake I was taken to the local Waitrose on a shopping trip which also required me to negotiate the shop with my crutches in the trolley whilst I pushed it around the store and found the items on my list. An everyday task which most of us probably loathe and / or take for granted but what a joy to be doing normal things again.

On 10th August I had my second overnight trip home which was again successful and rewarding. The therapy sessions of balancing, sitting, standing, kneeling, walking, exercising and tackling stairs were paying off.

On 14th August it was time to say my goodbyes to the staff at Ascot Rehab and head for home! When I was admitted to East Surrey Hospital in April in such extreme pain I thought I might be given some intravenous pain relief for a couple of days then be on my way again. How little any of us knew about the ordeal that was to come. I was to learn more about myself, the human body and hospitals than I had ever wished to. As I look back now I find it hard to believe that it is my journey and not someone else's I am reading about. I am grateful for all the prayers, thoughts and good wishes from the community and for the unfailing love and support of my family and friends. I will continue to receive physio for the foreseeable future. I hope to be able to drive and work again and to resume 'normal' duties at home and within the community. For now I am pleased to be able to share my story so far and I look forward to getting back into routine in Capel and my familiar local territory.



Editor: And now a nice new occasional feature ... **A Seasonal Recipe!** Thanks to George Ede for this recipe and happy baking everyone!

It would appear to be a good year for apples this year if the trees I have seen are anything to go by. To me, there is nothing quite as satisfying as picking nature's harvest from the hedgerows at this time of year. It is a joy to watch the blackberries grow and ripen as the summer progresses towards autumn. Blackberries contain a wide array of important nutrients including potassium, magnesium and calcium, as well as vitamins A, C, E and most of our B vitamins. They are also a rich source of anthocyanins, powerful antioxidants that give blackberries their deep purple colour. Around 10 blackberries count towards one of your five-a-day. So why not get out and pick some and try this recipe as a change to the traditional crumble.



Blackberry and Apple Loaf Ingredients

250g self-raising flour
175g butter
175g light muscovado sugar
½ tsp cinnamon
2 rounded tbsp demerara sugar
1 small eating apple, such as Cox's, quartered (not cored or peeled)
2 large eggs, beaten
1 orange, finely grated zest
1 tsp baking powder
225g blackberries

<u>Method</u>

Preheat the oven to 180C/gas 4/fan 160C. Butter and line the bottom of a 1.7 litre loaf tin (see tip below). In a large bowl, rub the flour, butter and muscovado sugar together with your fingers to make fine crumbs. Measure out 5 level tbsp of this mixture into a small bowl for the topping, and mix in to it the cinnamon and demerara sugar. Set aside.

Coarsely grate the apple down to the core and mix in with the eggs and the zest. Stir the baking powder into the rubbed-in mixture in the large bowl, then quickly and lightly stir in the egg mixture until it drops lightly from the spoon. Don't overmix.

Gently fold in three quarters of the berries with a metal spoon, trying not to break them up. Spoon into the tin and level. Scatter the rest of the berries on top. Sprinkle over the topping and bake for 1½ -1 hour 20 minutes. Check after 50 minutes and cover loosely with foil if it is browning too much. When done the cake will feel firm, but test with a skewer.

Leave in the tin for 30 minutes before turning out, then cool on a wire rack. Peel off the paper before cutting. Will keep wrapped in foil or in a tin for up to 2 days.

Bible Q&A: Daniel and Jonah – history or story?

Our Bible Q&A series explores the questions you've asked us about the Bible.

You've been asking questions about the Bible. We've asked Mark Woods to have a go at answering some of them!



Question:

If we look at stories such as Daniel and Jonah, how sure are we that they are actually based upon historical events, rather than stories or parables to help us understand how God [acted] and hence how we should react today?

Answer:

The Bible is full of different types or genres of literature, like history, law and poetry. Unsurprisingly, not everyone agrees on these, although there are often clues in the Bible itself. One way or another, it's important to allow the books in the Bible to speak on their own terms rather than impose our categories on them. So, there are stories in the Old Testament that some people think look as though they might be 'parables' in the sense that they're told to make a point or communicate something true rather than to be taken literally. One of these might be the story of Jonah, who's swallowed by a 'great fish' and spat up unharmed on dry ground. Another might be the story in Daniel of Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego, who survived the fiery furnace – or even Daniel in the lions' den. There are two issues here. One is whether God works miracles, and most Christians believe that he does. Another is what kind of story we are meant to be reading – is it history, or something else?

The problem comes when these issues get tangled up together. So if someone says they don't think Jonah is historical fact, they might be accused of thinking God doesn't work miracles, or that the Bible isn't true. In fact they're just making a judgement about what sort of story it is, while still believing it's inspired Scripture. People will come to different conclusions about some stories, and it's not always possible to be certain one way or another. Perhaps a good question to bear in mind, though, is, 'What difference would it make to how I read the story if I think it's not historically true?' Sometimes the answer is, 'Quite a lot'; at other times it's, 'None at all.'



Surrey Bishops declare climate emergency and pledge 7 climate-care commitments Date: 12 August 2019

The Bishops of Guildford and Dorking, Andrew Watson and Jo Bailey Wells, have joined forces with other organisations in declaring a climate emergency today and pledged to follow seven climate-care commitments.

Bishop Andrew encouraged all Christians to join in making these commitments, saying:

"Transformation is needed in all our lives, and in industries and establishments across the world, to keep the rise in temperature of the planet to less than two degrees Celsius. As Christians we need lift our voices to join with the growing environmental movement - to tell the truth about the climate catastrophe, to repent of the behaviours that has caused this emergency, and to prioritise this ministry as an act of sacrificial love to all people, including those yet to be born."

Bishop Andrew and Bishop Jo's climate-care commitments are to:

- Switch to a clean energy provider
- Use cars less committing to car-share, cycle or walk at least once every week
- Cut down on meat, especially red meat
- Grow as much fruit and veg as possible
- Reuse all plastic bags and avoid disposable products
- Use heating as sparingly as possible and never to use a tumble dryer
- Give regularly to charitable organisations that strive to safeguard God's creation

The Diocese of Guildford is working with its partners to raise awareness of current and emerging issues affecting the communities across the region. One of its key partners, Surrey County Council, has recently declared a climate emergency in the county and the diocese is joining them in making this a priority. As well as this partnership, the Diocese of Guildford is helping to facilitate a conference – *12 years to save the planet* – with the University of Surrey and the South East England Faith Forum on 16 September. It will be an opportunity to share perspectives about climate change from a number of different faiths, including Christian, Jewish, Muslim, Sikh and Buddhist and the role of people of faith in reducing climate change.

The Diocese of Guildford prides itself on being a steward of God's wonderful creation, having been only the second diocese to receive a <u>bronze Eco Diocese award</u> from A Rocha UK. This award is a demonstration of the diocese's commitment to caring for God's earth in five key areas of church life: worship and teaching, management of church buildings, management of church land, community/global engagement and lifestyle.

Bishop Andrew encourages all churches in the diocese to join the 48 churches currently registered to be Eco-Churches:

"In this diocese, we are committed to being part of the transformation of our world, recognising the urgency required to transition to a net zero-carbon way of life. We have worked with A Rocha to achieve the Bronze Eco-Diocese award, and I encourage all of our churches to become Eco-Churches. We will endeavour to achieve the Silver Eco-Diocese award as soon as we can, and hopefully in time for a visit by our Archbishop in March next year."




Parish Eco team news

Several people have asked us to explain what we need to do to achieve silver award status as ECO churches.

We are one ECO team for the PCC but St Margaret's and St John each have their own ECO church registration and even though we do as much as we can together there are some areas (building and land notably) that are different. For the sake of reporting on award status it is therefore more helpful to keep them separate.

St John achieved bronze status in summer 2018. Shortly we hope to report on the notice board in church how we achieved the points we have now. Following are the 5 categories in which we can earn points and a short explanation what we can do to reach the next level. As you will see there are different ways to achieve the points required. The dials below show the most recent status.



Worship and teaching

The maximum of points we can achieve here is 100. We currently have 81 which is more than 50% so we

have achieved silver in this category. In fact we are already in the gold here with more than 75% of points achieved.

Buildings

In this category we would have to score 135 out of our maximum 265. There would be several ways to get us the required additional 20 points. Measuring our energy use and calculating our carbon footprint would earn us 10. Offsetting our carbon footprint would give us the other 10 and setting targets for reducing our carbon footprint and reducing our energy would be 20 in one go.

Using recycled paper for all our printing and using environmentally friendly cleaning products only (we use hand wash and dish wash at the moment and are working on toilet cleaner) would give us 5 points each. The list goes on but this gives a good idea.

Land

We are only 15 points away from the 80 point silver target in this category. Introducing bat boxes and hedgehog hibernation opportunities would give us 5 points each. Establishing a mowing regime to encourage wildflowers would be 10. Having yearly wildlife surveys would be 10 points again.

Community and global

We have 118 out of 230 here so we are just in silver but there is a lot more we can easily do: Commit as church to pray for an oversees environmental charity (eg <u>greatgreenwall.org</u>) for 5 points or be more committed to serving LOAF (local, organic, animal friendly, fairtrade) products at functions of our church for 2 points each. Each of these would bring us closer to the gold threshold of 175.

Lifestyle

This is where we lag behind with only 44 out of 160. To gain silver we will have to collect another 36 points in this category. Lifestyle is all about encouraging our members to do things like recycle, invest ethically, reduce car use, buy locally etc. We find things like that hard in our part of the world and easily perceive them as patronising. As a team we haven't quite found a way to do this that we are comfortable with. Any ideas are most welcome!

Amazon fires 'destroy hope' says C of E bishop by Paul Wilkinson 23 August 2019

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Smoke rises from the forest in São Gabriel da Cachoeira, a region of the Amazon near the Colombian border. Roman Catholic bishops in Latin America have called on the international community to act to save the Amazon rainforest in Brazil, which is threatened by wildfires.

On the eve of the G7 meeting in Biarritz, in France, this weekend, the coordinating body of Latin American bishops' conferences issued a statement pressing governments and the UN to save what they describe as "the lung of the world". It emphasises the planetary significance of the Amazon and "the seriousness of this tragedy, whose impact is not merely local, or even regional, but planetary in scale".

The Bishops write: "To our brothers and sisters of the indigenous peoples who live in this beloved territory we express our closeness and unite our voices with theirs to cry out to the world for solidarity and prompt attention to halt this devastation.

"Amazonia is a region rich in biodiversity, it is multi-ethnic, multi-cultural and multi-religious, a mirror of humanity which, to defend life, calls for structural and personal changes from all human beings, states, and the Church. This situation goes beyond the sphere of the Church in the Amazon because it addresses the universal Church and the future of the whole planet. What happens in the Amazon is not a local matter, but has global reach. If the Amazon suffers, the world suffers."

Satellite data published by the Brazilian National Institute for Space Research indicates that 75,000 forest fires were recorded in Brazil in the first eight months of the year, an 85-per-cent increase on the same period last year. Most of them are in the Amazon region.

Blame for the fires have been widely ascribed to the recently elected Brazilian President, Jair Bolsonaro, who has encouraged loggers and farmers to clear the land. He has since dismissed the Institute's head and this week denounced the French President Emmanuel Macron's call for the G7 to discuss the fires as indicative of "a colonialist mentality".

President Bolsonaro has previously suggested that environmental NGOs might have started the fires to attract foreign funding, although he has since admitted that he had no evidence for that.

On Friday, the European Commission's chief spokeswoman, Mina Andreeva, backed President Macron. She said: "The Commission is deeply worried. The Amazon is the world's largest rainforest and contains one tenth of the world's species. The sense of urgency is, indeed, warranted."

She suggested that pressure could be brought on Brazil through the EU-Mercosur free-trade deal, which includes binding commitments to implement the Paris climate agreement. "It is a way of working with Brazil and others to push and encourage each other to live up to the commitments we have made together in the Paris Agreement and work together on other environmental issues."

A Downing Street spokeswoman said that the Prime Minister, Boris Johnson, was deeply concerned by the increase in fires and the loss of habitats: "The effect of these fires will be felt around the world, which is why we need international action to protect the world's rainforests. The Prime Minister will use the G7 to call for a renewed focus on protecting nature and tackling climate change together."

The Bishop of Salisbury, the Rt Revd Nicholas Holtam, the Church of England's lead bishop on the environment, spoke of "a climate emergency which does not know international boundaries. The Amazon is a global resource as well as a national one. In the last 36 hours, I have been asked to sign a variety of climate-related petitions and letters. People are concerned. So our politicians should be talking about it and finding ways to act collectively.

"The economy is a wholly owned subsidiary of the environment. At the moment, there are so many initiatives to plant trees to help carbon capture. It is appalling to see such large areas of rainforest burn. They destroy more than the trees. They destroy hope."

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Aaron Kiely, a climate campaigner with Friends of the Earth, said that the deforestation of the Amazon was being accelerated under the Bolsonaro government, "which backs destructive industrial farming and logging. Bolsonaro has given the green light for the devastation of the Amazon by repeatedly weakening Brazil's environmental protection policies.


"But there is hope as this weekend Brazilians are organising protests in defence of the Amazon in at least 40 cities. People and governments are right to express horror at the fires, and there should be strong diplomatic pressure put on Bolsonaro's government to protect the lungs of our planet and the indigenous peoples who live there."



The Global Warming Policy Foundation, which rejects the concept of man-made global warming, said that, according to NASA satellite observations, there was nothing unusual about this year's Amazon fires. They appeared to be "slightly below average rates compared to fires in the last 15 years", the Foundation's director, Benny Peiser, said: "Whenever we experience extreme events such as the Amazon fires this year is important to look at the long-term trend of such events."


Wordsearch Clues and Answers – Holy Cross Day

Holy Cross Day (14th September) is when the Church celebrates the Cross as a symbol of triumph, as the sign of Christ's victory over death. It began back in the fourth century, when Helena, mother of the Christian Roman Emperor Constantine, travelled from Rome to Israel to seek out places of special significance to Christians.

Much of Jerusalem had been destroyed by the Romans in 135 AD, but even so, Helena located what she believed to be the sites of the Crucifixion and of the Burial (and modern archaeologists think she may well be correct). The sites were so close together that she built one large church over them - the Church of the Holy Sepulchre. And that church, built in honour of the Cross, was dedicated on 14th September 335.

The sign of the Cross has been used by Christians since early times. Tertullian, writing about AD 211, noted that Christians seldom did anything significant without making the sign of the cross.


Local club or society: How about cricket or amateur dramatics? Can you help your local enthusiasts by perhaps becoming club secretary?


