Dear all,

I love Van Gogh's painting 'Starry Night'! As I look and think about it I can hear Don McLean's haunting lyrics of 'Vincent (Starry, Starry Night)', written about the artist's life and struggles with mental illness and his struggle and passion as a painter. Apparently he only sold one painting in his lifetime. Simply amazing that now he is hailed as one of the most important post- impressionist painters! The painting was inspired by the view from his asylum room whilst recovering from a breakdown. Amazing too that during his time there he produced some of his most important paintings. We have a good view of the sky out here in our dark villages sometimes don't we? When you look up at the sky on a clear night and truly see



the heavens they are inspiring aren't they. In fact Vincent Van Gogh is quoted as saying: 'When I have a terrible need of shall I say the word - religion. Then I go out and paint the stars'. I like it!

Stars of course feature powerfully in the birth of Christ and the journey of the Magi in the telling of the story of Christmas. Always such a poignant conclusion to the Christmas events, these days the magi don't travel very far at all, just from one side of the church to another! Picking up the theme of the faithfulness of the Magi and the following of the star which brought them to Bethlehem as they journeyed searching for this new born King, the Church of England have once again produced another 'Follow the Star booklet - 12 Days of Christmas Wonder.' A lovely little resource, the booklet gives us 12 daily reflections based on that favourite Christmas Carol 'We three kings'. It begins on Christmas Day. Copies of this booklet will be available inside our churches at Capel and Ockley and we will handing them out to all who join us at our Christmas Services this year. I do hope you will join me in using these reflections as the journey begins with a star and ends with discovery!

As you will see on our Church services and events page there is lot to enjoy and be a part of once again this December. From Advent Sunday right at the beginning of the month I think we have anything and everything to help us prepare for and celebrate the festive season of Christmas and the New Year. Whether you like an early morning said Prayerbook Communion service, a traditional Matins or family holy communion with organist and choir or the more contemporary informal setting of Cafe Church and the band, there is something for everyone in the weeks ahead. There's Christmas Messy Church, a new Christingle event at the pavilion in Ockley, (not to be confused with our Christingle service in Capel at the beginning of February), an opportunity to dress up as an angel or shepherd even in our annual nativity service when our lovely donkeys come into church. There are loads of opportunities to sing carols whether outside when the Christmas tree lights are switched on in both villages, or inside at Capel Choral Society events at St Margaret's and St John's with a cup of tea thrown in, or our traditional 9 Lessons and Carols just before Christmas; we hope you will join us. Christmas itself truly begins at the crib service on Christmas Eve followed by 11pm Holy Communion, the first communion of Christmas. Christmas Day offers a choice of early Holy Communion at Capel and then this year we are all going to worship together later on Christmas morning at St Margaret's Ockley. There will be Holy Communion as part of the service but with our usual mix of the sacred and sometimes simply silly - in true Christmas style. Finally when you are fed up with Christmas fare why not join Bob and the Band at the Crown on Sunday 29th December for a special Cafe Church at 10.45am?!

We will be collecting gifts as usual to send to Christ Church in Brixton, for adults and children. Please label clearly for age and gender if appropriate. We will shortly be preparing hampers for those locally in great need and of course there are the collecting boxes in church for Leatherhead Start and Dorking Foodbank. Phew - it's exhausting isn't it - but great fun! So as well as all these opportunities to share and celebrate with one another, the whole point is that within all of these

events there will be time for us all to reflect on what it is all about and as I began I encourage you to take a booklet and 'follow the star' into the new year and beyond. In the words of the opening prayer in Follow the Star (see right):



Dear Readers.

Well here we are again at the end of one year and the approach of another. But we have the exciting time of Advent in the meantime. So much to look forward to with the coming of Christ at Christmas. We certainly have plenty going on to celebrate. This Saturday 30th November is the day the Christmas trees go up in the churchyard with the singing and lighting up at 5pm. Then we have the Advent Service on Sunday 1st December at St John's, followed by Messy Church, Carols on the Green, Christingle at the Pavilion, Ockley, our annual fun Nativity, Nine Lessons and so much more! Amongst all this excitement, joy and general merriment, it is important to remember that not everyone shares the joy or happiness. For some loneliness, sadness, isolation can lead to mental health issues such as depression. The Archbishop of Canterbury's 'Pause for Thought' recently broadcast on Radio 4 is published on page 19 of this issue. How brave of him to admit that he was

depressed last year and how reassuring for anyone reading it to find that even an Archbishop and a servant of God can suffer mentally, just as the rest of us can. To quote:-

'Christians believe we have a saviour, a rescuer, who knows intimately what it means to suffer. Amidst all the brokenness, Christ weeps with us. In his resurrection, I believe Christ restores us. Not necessarily in the way we expected, but he makes us whole in a way that makes sense.

It is my prayer today that anyone who is walking in darkness knows this: you are not alone. You are truly valued and deeply loved. Reaching out and talking to someone can be the first step back into the light.'

What a message to impart to everyone in this time of Advent as we approach the light of our Saviour being born for us at Christmas. No-one is alone and everyone is truly valued and deeply loved. Let us hope that all of us can find a way to share that love with those that might need us right now. Whether it is the Parish Christmas cards that we will be posting through the doors, the gifts given to our friends at Christchurch in Brixston, the local hampers or maybe much smaller gestures such as checking on a neighbour who may be lonely? Or maybe you know of someone that is suffering and could help encourage them to seek help just as the Archbishop did? I am sure that the season of partying and jollity all around must be especially hard and I hope that we can all find a way to play a small part in just easing that darkness just a little bit for someone?

My very sincere thanks to everyone who helped us raise £482.60 at our annual Christmas coffee morning for The Children's Society. So many of you were very kind in donating hamper gifts, providing cakes and for giving up your Saturday morning to come along and support us. As usual, I'd like to extend a particular thank you to the team who help me make it happen: Joy, Betty, Wendy and Liz Wombwell. Without them, I simply couldn't have made it happen. I will be giving up as co-ordinator of the Society in the New Year once the houseboxes have been handed in. For more details on this, see page 21.

In the meantime, the New Year will see the beginning of the Vicarage Fete team beginning to organise the 2020 Fete and Debbie von Bergen and I are already actively planning a new Christmas Fair for Capel to take place on 14th November 2020 to fundraise for our Parish - particularly the costs of things such as the churchyard wall repairs. If anyone would like to join either the Fete Committee or Debbie and I for organising the Christmas Fair, we would very much welcome your input and help!

Communal Christmas card scheme

Every year many of us buy lots of Christmas cards and write to all our family, friends, acquaintances, neighbours, colleagues etc to wish them a merry Christmas and a happy New Year. Some enjoy the job of writing cards but, listening to the conversations, many more find it a chore. There is also quite an environmental price to be paid for all those cards: paper is produced from wood and not all trees that are used are grown with regard for our planet. Most cards come in single use plastic, at best in multi-packs but often individually wrapped.

As an ECO church initiative, we would like to try out something new that will also help decorate our church: a communal Christmas card scheme. This year, instead of each of us writing cards for many of our fellow churchgoers we suggest we all write one card to the whole congregation. We will display the cards in a creative way in our churches and we can all look at the cards and see what good wishes have been sent to each of us. It would be very fitting if all who take part would consider making a contribution to a charity of a value similar to the amount saved by sending fewer cards. This could be Tree-Aid, our own PCC or another deserving cause of your choice. Please don't go so far though as to not send a card to someone who would still very much appreciate a Christmas card.

Ever wonder why Jesus was born when He was? The Bible tells us that "when the time had fully come, God sent forth His Son..." The Jewish people had been waiting for their Messiah for centuries. Why did God send Him precisely when He did?

Many biblical scholars believe that the 'time had fully come' for Jesus because of the politics of the time. The Roman Empire's sheer size and dominance had achieved something unique in world history: the opportunity for travel from Bethlehem to Berwick on Tweed without ever crossing into 'enemy territory' or needing a 'passport'.

For the first time ever, it was possible for 'common' people to travel wide and far, and quickly spread news and ideas. And all you needed were two languages - Greek to the east of Rome, and Latin to the west and north. You could set sail from Joppa (Tel Aviv) and head for any port on the Med. And the Roman roads ran straight and true throughout the empire.

So, the Roman Empire achieved something it never intended: it helped spread news of Christianity far and wide for 400 years. After that, the Empire crumbled, and the borders shut down. Not until the 19th century would people again roam so freely. The time for Jesus to be born, and for news of Him to be able to travel, had indeed 'fully come'.

25th December: The story of mince pies

Did you know that mince pies have been traditional English Christmas fare since the Middle Ages, when meat was a key ingredient? The addition of spices, suet and alcohol to meat came about because it was an alternative to salting and smoking in order to preserve the food. Mince pies used to be a different shape - cradle-shaped with a pastry baby Jesus on top.

25th December: World's oldest fake tree

Did you know that it is a family in Wiltshire, the Parkers, who claim to own the world's oldest artificial Christmas tree? It was bought in 1886, and it is still put up every year.

25th December: Mistletoe's smelly history

Did you know that the word 'mistletoe' means dung on a tree? The Anglo-Saxons thought that mistletoe grew in trees where birds had left their droppings. Mistel means dung, and tan means twig.

25th December: Why was Jesus born in a barn?

Our pretty Christmas cards do not do it justice – the stable that Jesus was born in would have been smelly, dirty, and full of mess. So why did God not provide something better for His beloved Son? Why let Joseph and Mary scrounge around until they ended up in a smelly stable?

Perhaps because the King of Kings being born in a foul stable is a perfect picture of redemption. Jesus came from glory into a world filled with the dirt, filth and darkness of sin. And Jesus was not put off by darkness in the least – instead, He came to be the Light of the World. Thank God for His unspeakable gift. No wonder the angels sang "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men." (Luke 2:14)

"O FOR THE WINGS OF A DOVE" ... Musings of life as a chorister


I have been singing in church choirs for over 60 years!! My mother was a very devout Christian and as such my 2 brothers and I were "volunteered" into the local church, although with the age gap I seem to remember not always at the same time. The church was 2 miles away with 2 practices a week and 3 services on Sundays – Matins @ 11am / Sunday School @ 3pm / Evensong @ 6.30pm.

My bike ride would take me across the A30 – even quite busy in those days but wouldn't be allowed now - at the age of 8!! adventurous times - not quite sure how I managed this on cold winter days although I did manage to learn how to tweet like an owl whilst riding home one evening with no hands on the handlebars! ... not to be recommended! (a bit like the warning on the TV 'don't' try this at home!).

Our choir master – Mr. Troop – was Canadian and quite severe. On the bright side we got paid 3d a Sunday and 2/6d for weddings. On the way cycling home Saturday afternoons after weddings, I always stopped at the local toy shop and bought the latest Dinky toy – usually a racing car. Some I still have and were well played with. In fact I've just sold two well-used examples for £50 each, a good investment and memories of happy days – all through opening my mouth!

Choir was an introduction to music and singing and whilst I could adapt to pitch quite well, I never did understand the intricacies and finer points of the various musical formats eg sharp / natural / flat etc or develop an acumen to playing a musical instrument – much better to play sport instead!

When my voice broke I was demoted to the back benches of the school choir to learn a whole new scale but at a much lower level. Harmony then reared its notes and was another new experience. Having already learnt the treble line and occasional descant it was not easy to develop this lower level, in spite of the ability to sing way down low!

Throughout my life and the various villages frequented, I have always entered into the spirit of the local church and more specifically the musical side of choirs.

Waltham, Kent was a small village 6 miles south of Canterbury – very old church – no choir – very small congregation. We actually lived in Anvil Green a small hamlet on the outskirts, famous for often being mentioned by Ian McCaskill on his weather report as being the coldest place in Great Britain – if you couldn't see Siberia you could certainly feel it!!

Little Cornard in Suffolk (Martin Shaw / Hills of the North Rejoice), just outside Sudbury on the Essex border, was another small church in the middle of a farmer's field with a regular choir of 6 and a vicar who looked like Buffalo Bill but answered to the name of John Cotton. He once had a shouting match from the pulpit with Rachel who was 3 years old at the time — Rachel won and had to be carted outside beyond hearing distance!

East Haddon, just north of Northampton, was in a benefice of 6 churches so there was a combined choir to do the rounds. This was great fun and united all the parishes – a rare and often unique practice within a benefice! Every year we got invited to Althorp to sing for the Spencers' Christmas Party with the highlight one year being The Twelve Days of Christmas staged on the appropriate 12 levels of the huge main staircase, starting at the bottom with "a partridge in the pear tree" and going up. Level 10 actually had "10 Lords a Leaping!!"

Every year at Peterborough Cathedral there was a gathering of the Diocese choirs to sing evensong. The numbers were so great that this usually resulted in the choir singing in the congregational seats and vice versa. The only downside was being surrounded by 150 other bass and whilst you certainly learnt your part, that is all you heard. One year I opted to sit with the congregation and just hear what the combined effort sounded like – pretty impressive!

And so to Capel. A small village in the Surrey countryside but for us probably "more suburbia" than we are used to in relation to all the previous villages.

I joined the Church choir back in 2002 when the vicar was (I think) John Maskell. The organist was Tony Goddard but can't remember too many members of the choir. Since then we have progressed (and improved) to the state we are in today. Christmas is a time for giving, and we do it well. The British have been ranked among the most generous nations in the world, after a recent study found that six out of ten of us have helped a stranger in the past month.

The research, which surveyed 1.3 million people in 128 countries over a decade, found that despite a growing culture of charitable giving, there has been a downward trend in thoughtful behaviour in many of the world's wealthiest places.

However, the report, commissioned by the Charities Aid Foundation, found that the UK now appears 7th in the worldwide rankings for generosity.

60 per cent of us have helped a stranger in the last month, with 71 per cent of us giving money to charity, and 30 per cent offering even our time, in order to help a good cause.

The countries which topped the global rankings are: United States, Myanmar, New Zealand, Australia, Ireland and Canada. At the bottom of the table, ranked lowest in terms of generosity, were the State of Palestine, Serbia, Yemen and Greece. China was ranked the least generous of all nations.

According to the toy shop Hamleys, board games are going to be popular this Christmas – but not as you knew them. Instead, the 'smart' version of Pictionary has been called one of the 'must-have' toys this Christmas. It is just one of many classic board games which have been given a digital makeover, including Monopoly.



Two Lord's Prayers



In October we sang a choral Matins to the music of Charles Stamford. When we were practicing the question was asked 'why do we have the Lord's Prayer twice and in slightly different forms?' A fair question that none of us present could answer. It is said twice in Evensong too, but I had never stopped to think why. It was just the way it was and the way I have always known it. When I started to look-up why I typed into Google something along the lines of the question, but there was no immediate answer – not even in Wikipedia.

The story begins with St Benedict and the Rule of Benedict that even today sets the pattern of prayer in monasteries based upon Psalm 119 verse 164 "I will praise you seven times a day" and verse 62 "At midnight I rise to thank you". So Benedict's Rule revolves around a pattern of eight services (Hours) - 2.00 am Matins, 5.00 am Lauds, 7.00 am Prime, 9.00 am Terce, 12.00 Sext, 3.00 pm None, 5.00 pm Vespers, and 8.00 pm Compline, and it was from these that matins and evensong were developed. Firstly, local priests in the Middle Ages started to merge some of these services together, probably to make their task easier, but then they added additional parts into those new services leaving them long and unwieldly. It was then Thomas Cranmer (1489-1556) when he was Archbishop of Canterbury from 1533 onwards during the reigns of Henry VIII, Edward VI, and Mary. Cranmer who took the next big step. He thought that although the Hours were observed in monasteries and similarly in many places outside them too, they were unsuitable because of the number, they were in Latin, elaborate and contained insufficient scripture.

During the reign of Edward VI Cranmer wrote the forerunners of the 1662
Book of Common Prayer. This became known as the First (1549) and Second (1552) Prayer Book of Edward VI.
When Henry VIII died in 1547 Edward became king at the age of nine. The government was effectively in the hands of the Duke of Somerset and it was at this time that the English church started to take on a more protestant tone. Images of saints, crucifixes were removed and clergy were allowed to marry. Cranmer wrote his prayer book based upon the Hours and aspects of other European services. He skilfully merged what local priests had done before the two services of Matins and Lauds into his matins and Vespers and Compline into evensong. Whilst he was willing to be radical and use English rather than Latin he was careful not to lose parts of the old services. In the merging of these services we ended up with two Lord's Prayers.

So why are the Lord's prayers different? That is simply because in the Middle Ages the doxology was often used as a standalone part of the Roman Catholic Mass. It originally came from the Didache which was a very early version of the catechism, and appears to be based upon a prayer of David in the First Book of Chronicles chapter 29.

Thine, O LORD is the greatness, and the power, and the glory, and the victory, and the majesty: for all that is in the heaven and in the earth is thine; thine is the kingdom, O LORD, and thou art exalted as head above all.

Some of the early English versions of the Bible erroneously included the doxology in the Lord's prayer in Matthew chapter 6 and it was this that was used as the first Lord's prayer. The second Lord's prayer was that from Luke chapter 11 which never had the doxology.

Christingle - a generous present from the Moravians

It is the Moravians whom we have to thank for bringing us the Christingle. Especially one Moravian clergyman: John de Watteville.

On 20th December 1747, John de Watteville was taking a children's service in his Moravian church in Marienborn, Germany. He led the children in some hymns and read out verses which the children themselves had written to celebrate the birth of Jesus. Then he explained to the children that true happiness only comes through knowing Jesus. Jesus, said John de Watteville, "has kindled in each little heart a flame which keeps burning to their joy and our happiness".

John de Watteville then went on to illustrate that 'flame'. He gave each child a little lighted wax candle, tied around with a red ribbon. He ended his service with a little prayer: "Lord Jesus, kindle a flame in these children's hearts, that theirs like Thine become".

The visual aid was a great success with the children; for the Marienborn Diary for that day concludes: "hereupon the children went full of joy with their lighted candles to their rooms and so went glad and happy to bed".

The candle and red ribbon were remembered the following year, and the following after that.... The years came and went, and as the Moravians began to travel beyond Germany, so they took the custom with them: to Labrador, to Pennsylvania, to Tibet and Suriname, to the Caribbean and South Africa. In each country the Christians adapted it for their own use.

No one knows for certain when the word 'Christingle' was first used with regard to the custom. No one even knows where the word 'Christingle' comes from. Some people say it is from the old Saxon word 'ingle' (fire), meaning 'Christ-fire or light'. Another theory is that it derives from the German 'engel' (angel), meaning 'Christ-angel'.

In any event, the symbolism of Christingle gradually developed, until today the Moravians in the British Province use an orange, representing the world, with a lighted candle to represent Christ, the Light of the World. Nuts, raisins and sweets on cocktail sticks around the candle represent God's bounty and goodness in providing the fruits of the earth. Red paper, forming a frill around the base of the candle, reminds us of the blood of Christ shed for all people on the cross at Calvary.

In Moravian churches, the Christingle Service is usually held on the Sunday before Christmas or on Christmas Eve. The website for the Moravian Church says: "We are glad that the Moravian Church has been able to make this contribution to the wider Christian world."



Editor: Below is the text of the Archbishop of Canterbury's 'Thought For The Day' on BBC Radio 4's Today programme broadcast recently.

Good morning. Last week was Mental Illness Awareness week. I was struck by the fact that people from all over the world and from all walks of life spoke on social media about their experiences of mental illness. Much has been made of social media worsening mental health issues. On this occasion it enabled people to share their stories, communicate honestly and feel connected to others.

We often think it's just us who are struggling, that everyone else is doing okay. That's because we don't talk about our mental health. The stigma is still there, so we feel more alone than we need to.



Last year, I realised that I was depressed. I have a daughter who has been very open about her experiences with depression and she helped me see that it wasn't something to be ashamed of – it's just life, and I got help. Others still face that stigma and loneliness. Today we will be hosting a mental health conference at Lambeth Palace, looking at ways the church and others can encourage communities of love, support and openness.

Good communities are places where mental health issues do not prevent people from having authentic and honest relationships. Good communities are able to hold pain, honour and acknowledge it, whilst putting it within the wider story of God and His hope for His people.

Christians believe we have a saviour, a rescuer, who knows intimately what it means to suffer. Amidst all the brokenness, Christ weeps with us. In his resurrection, I believe Christ restores us. Not necessarily in the way we expected, but he makes us whole in a way that makes sense.

It is my prayer today that anyone who is walking in darkness knows this: you are not alone. You are truly valued and deeply loved. Reaching out and talking to someone can be the first step back into the light.

Church engages millions through apps and social media

Church of England prayer apps were used more than five million times over the last year as a record number of people sought Christian contemplation and reflection online, according to new figures published today.

Apps allowing users to pray the ancient 'Daily Office' of morning, evening and night prayer were used 4.2 million times on Apple devices alone in the last 12 months, an increase of 446,000 on the year before, new figures show.

The figures do not include other social media prayers, reflections and posts by the Church of England, which now have an average reach of 3.6 million every month, an increase on 2018.

The digital figures were published alongside the Church of England's *Statistics for Mission 2018*, and showed that some 4,400 churches – more than a third of those responding – run courses teaching the basics of the Christian faith.

These included the *Pilgrim Course*, launched in 2013, and the *Alpha Course* which introduces participants to the Christian faith through a series of talks and discussions.

The figures showed 3,200 churches reported running activities such as youth groups or youth-focused services for children and teenagers aged between 11 and 17 years old.

The statistics showed 1.12 million regular worshippers at Church of England churches in 2018.

There were nearly eight million attendances at Church of England Christmas and Advent services combined in 2018, including special services for civic organisations, schools and local communities. The Church's reach on social media throughout

Advent and Christmas 2018 with the #FollowTheStar campaign was 7.94 million – up by 1.14 million from 2017.

On average, 871,000 people attended Church of England services and acts of worship each week, 2.6% lower than in 2017. A further 175,000 people attended services for schools in Church of England churches.

Other figures from the digital report show that *AChurchNearYou.com*, the church finding website, received more than 38million page views in the last 12 months, a big increase on the year before.

Since launching in May 2018, the Church of England's Alexa skill has been asked more than 100,000 questions by Christians and people exploring the faith.

The Bishop of Ripon, Dr Helen-Ann Hartley, said: "The Church's digital innovation is enabling people to hear the good news of Jesus Christ in ways that weren't previously possible alongside regular Sunday worship and at significant moments such as Christmas and Easter.

"It is also really striking just how many churches are running courses in the basics of Christianity. This shows a readiness to explore the Christian faith."

Call for prayer for Christians in Pakistan

UK-based Release International has made Pakistan its focus for prayer this year, and continues to be deeply concerned for Christians in that country.

As a spokesman for Release International explains, "Most Christians in Pakistan are poor, illiterate and vulnerable to abuse, especially young women and girls. Believers face discrimination in education, employment and the law. Pakistan's blasphemy laws have been used to make false allegations against Christians, often to settle personal vendettas."

Release has helped Christians who have been falsely accused of blasphemy and given support to families of prisoners like Asia Bibi, a mother who spent 10 years in jail on charges that were later thrown out by the Supreme Court.

Speaking recently from Canada, the 54-year old called on Christians everywhere to remember others behind bars.

In a YouTube video, she says: "I, Asia Bibi, believe in Jesus. My belief is strong. I never let my belief weaken."

And Asia gave this a message to the world: "Stay true to your beliefs. Even if you have to face the sword, please hold firm to your faith. Even if you have to sacrifice everything."

Asia was picking berries in a field when she brought water for her Muslim co-workers to drink. But they refused, calling her and her water unclean, because she was a Christian. They went on to accuse her of committing blasphemy against the prophet Mohammed.

The Supreme Court ruled the charges against Asia were false and malicious, and threw out the case – after eight years on death row. You can read more of Asia's story at https://releaseinternational.org/asia-bibi-speaks-out-from-canada/

Release has long campaigned for Pakistan's blasphemy laws to be repealed. It is working with partners in the country to support and care for prisoners of faith.

"Yet despite the persecution in Pakistan, the church remains strong in faith and hope," says Release CEO Paul Robinson. "Will your church support them in that?" (See below for prayers for Pakistan and reconciliation).







20 years ago, as 1999 drew to a close, the Church of England marked the Millennium by distributing thousands of young yew trees across England. In all, about 7000 seedlings were given to parishes requesting them.

It was explained that the yew tree could be seen as 'a metaphor for the life of faith in this country over the last 4000 years', as well as a symbol of the spiritual life, 'with its dormant periods and its coming to life'.

David Shreeve, director of the Conservation Foundation, said that the yew trees were "planted in the spirit of a living link with the birth of Jesus, and as a symbol that, if we wanted this millennium yew to live for another 2000 years, we would need to care for and cherish our local environment."

Mr Shreeve believes that the project made an impact on the Church, helping to pave the way for a greater emphasis on caring for Creation, including the appointment of more diocesan environment officers.

Yews are the oldest living things in Britain. The Woodland Trust explains that a yew is not even considered 'ancient' until it is over 900 years old. The oldest tree in the UK, the Fortingall Yew, is estimated to be between 2000 and 3000 years old.

Ethical Christmas presents



How much damage to the earth will we manage to do this Christmas? Those hundreds of millions of presents we are going to buy come from somewhere – usually raw resources. Are the presents worth the strain on our already struggling planet?

Here are some alternative presents, that are eco-friendly, useful, and fairly traded.

Christian Aid (christianaid.org.uk/christmaspresents) invites supporters to send them a donation, and in return, they will send a 'lively' personalised card to your friend or relations, describing the gift you have chosen to give on their behalf.

Send a Cow (sendacow.org/gifts) also invites supporters to send a donation for a range of practical gifts, for use in helping people from Ethiopia to Zambia.

Traidcraft (traidcraftshop.co.uk) offers everything from bamboo tights to clocks to food and cosmetics.

WaterAid (shop.wateraid.org) provides sanitation equipment (such as taps to promote hand washing) to villages in Africa, Asia or Central America. The person you nominate will receive a card to let them know this has been done in their name.

World Vision (musthavegifts.org) offers you the choice of sending various specific items from mosquito nets to garden tools, all of which they say are specifically asked for and needed.

With **WWF** (wwf.org.uk) you can adopt a wild animal, from a dolphin to an orangutan. WWF will send your nominated person an adoption certificate and even cuddly toy.











C of E's Environment Group calls for greater action on Climate Change

The Church of England's Environmental Advisory Group has called for all parts of the Church to recognise the Climate Crisis and step up its action to safeguard God's creation.

In guidance sent recently to bishops, dioceses and church leadership teams, the Environmental Working Group (EWG) points to the ambitious programme of action required, covering everything from the Church's buildings to its investment assets.

The paper also highlights future mission challenges including a need for churches to be ready to provide sanctuary for those affected by extreme weather events in this country and beyond as the impact of climate change accelerates.

With work already underway to develop an Energy Footprint Tool and to offer local energy audits for churches, schools and houses, the EWG says the assessment of our carbon footprint must extend to all areas within the overall Church of England portfolio such as investment holdings in farming and forestry.

The EWG brings together experts who oversee the Church's Environmental Programme. They plan to bring a motion to General Synod in 2020 proposing revised carbon targets for the Church with an ambition for net zero emissions by 2050.

The work of local Diocesan Environment Officers is also identified as key, and they can help resource parishes and local communities.

Canon David Winter on the 50th anniversary of the abolition of capital punishment.

A life for a life

When do you think capital punishment was abolished in Britain? It was actually 50 years ago this month, in December 1969. It ended the macabre ritual of a judge donning a black cap, solemnly declaring that the accused was found guilty and would 'be taken hence to a place of public execution...and there to be hanged by the neck until you be dead.' On the day of execution, a crowd would gather outside the prison waiting to hear the eight o'clock bell confirming the execution was complete.

A movement against capital punishment had grown steadily during the 1950's, fuelled by 'public' shock at the execution of a woman for a crime of passion. Her name was Ruth Ellis and she was found guilty of shooting her lover, David Blake.

Though Ruth's story was tragic the incident that remains on my mind is that of Timothy Evans. Found guilty of murdering his wife and infant daughter he was hanged in March 1950. Subsequently it emerged beyond any doubt that the murder, and several others, was the work of John Reginald Christie. Christie lived with his wife in the ground floor flat of his property 10 Rillington Place, Camden.

Evans, who was mentally immature, had been persuaded to confess to a murder in which he was not, in any way, involved. It was a grave miscarriage of justice. Years later a friend gave me a book which told the whole appalling story. He had been one of the lawyers in the team that had tried to defend Evans. Today, Evans would have been released, pardoned and paid compensation. But we cannot bring someone back from the dead.


