This Sunday we come to one of my favourite Sundays, Christ the King, or some may know it as Stir Up Sunday due to the Post Communion prayer set for this day. Whilst some may think of this as the traditional day in which Christmas puddings were stirred up, the readings set for today both inspire and stir up faith, giving us a wonderful picture of Christ's position as the one true King of creation who has the power to forgive, to bless and also to judge. Judgement not on what we have necessarily believed but on how we have treated others. Matthew draws us into a vivid cosmic scenario, with the Son of Man enthroned in glory, surrounded by angels in the presence of all nations. Yet the focus is on individuals, especially the poorest, weakest, least respected, forgotten members of society. The message is clear - loving service lies at the heart of this Messiah's rule. It starts at the bottom, which those whose struggles are greatest and whose ability to give in return is smallest. This is the crux of his kingship. Whilst commanding heavenly authority he is one with the stranger, those who are naked, hungry, sick or imprisoned. Yet this is not just a humanitarian ethic or action taken for reward. No, to see Jesus in the stranger etc is to perceive each person as a unique self with their individual and distinctive personhood, to care for and love them as we would care for and love ourselves. It is on this, not on confession of faith, justification, grace or forgiveness of sins that we shall be judged. This is backed up by the Old Testament reading from the book of Ezekiel where the greatness of God is demonstrated in God's capacity to find, protect, provide for and guide God's people. God is presented like a shepherd, one who is diligent and compassionate, gathering those who have been scattered and providing sustenance for them. This is in contrast with those who establish themselves as leaders but who exercise and unjust form of power and control. The New Testament reading for today presents us with conventional terms to describe the greatness of God where Paul's guides the fragile new community of the church. Paul demonstrates that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ exercises power in a different way. God's power brings enlightenment and hope and is exercised on behalf of those who are the church. Let us pray that we will be filled with a thirst for holy justice, overflowing love so that we may see Christ in how we serve others.
